Dying to Live

Offering Ourselves as Living Sacrifices
January 23, 2022

Today we're talking about laying down our lives as true and proper worship.

After all, Jesus said, "whoever loses their life for *Me* will find it." (Mt 16:25) So answer *me this:* **Are you** *alive?* **Are you** *sure?* How can we *know?* Well, *actually* ...

We know that we have passed from death to life, because we love each other. Anyone who does not love remains in death. [So, are you alive?] Anyone who hates a brother or sister [i.e. fellow believer] is a murderer, [because Jesus said that unresolved anger with a fellow believer is murder-in-the-heart (Mat 5:21-22)] and you know that no murderer [literally or emotionally] has eternal life residing in him. [Because hate and love don't room together. So – yikes! – how do we know if we actually love each other enough? Well] This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down His life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. – 1 John 3:14-16 NIV







So we gotta decide if we're gonna be life takers or life givers. The choice is between taking theirs (by refusing to try and resolve any animosity between us), or giving ours, by dying to self, and laying aside our pride, and going all-in for the cause of Christ – as opposed to simply making a contribution to the cause and telling ourselves we've paid our dues.

What's the difference? Well after Jesus declared all foods clean, (Mk 7:19) a hen and a pig decided to pool their resources and offer the King of Kings a breakfast of bacon and eggs. The chicken made a very nice contribution, but that pig was *all in*. Thing is, it's much *easier* to just *die* – or as John says, "remain in death" – than to die-to-self! That's why Paul says:

I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, [on display on the cross] to offer your bodies as a <u>living sacrifice</u>, holy and <u>pleasing</u> to God—this is your <u>true</u> and <u>proper worship</u>. Do not conform to the pattern of this world, [Jesus said, "If you love <u>only</u> those who <u>love you</u>, what reward is there for <u>that?</u>" (Mt 5:46)] but be <u>transformed</u> [into loving others, by showing mercy, like the <u>One</u> who <u>had</u> — and continues to <u>have</u> — mercy on you] by the <u>renewing</u> [by God's <u>Word</u> wherein we <u>view</u> God's <u>mercy</u>] of your <u>mind</u>. [Wherein most of <u>our murders</u> take place] — Romans 12:1-2 NIV

So, what's the very *first* thing you *have* to *do* to become a living sacrifice? *Live*. How? *Love*. How? *Die*. To self. Live-love-die. Because, *that's* how ...

We *know* that we have *passed* from <u>death</u> to <u>life</u>, *because* we <u>love</u> each other. Anyone who does not *love* remains in *death*. [And therefore *can't* offer themselves as a *living* sacrifice] ... *This* is how we *know* what <u>love</u> *is:* Jesus Christ <u>laid down His life</u> for us. And we ought to <u>lay down our lives</u> for our brothers and sisters. – 1 John 3:14-16 NIV

So, are you making a nice contribution, or you *all in?* The word "living" tells us it's an **ongoing commitment**, and "sacrifice" tells us it's **complete surrender**. So a *living sacrifice* is an ongoing commitment of complete surrender to *live* and *love* as the Lord loves us, rather than doing as the world does and trying to save your bacon! We're simply putting His mercy on display, by duplicating in our own small way to others, the incredible thing He did for *us*. So, are you all in?

We can deceive ourselves when our heart is moved to make something right, by settling for talking about how we feel rather than acting on our conviction. Love is an action in response to a feeling. Self-delusion is deriving self-satisfaction from compassionate feelings alone.

Dear children, let us not love with words or tongue but with actions and in truth. This then is how we know that we belong to the truth, and how we set our hearts at rest in His presence whenever our hearts condemn us. – 1 John 3:18-20 NIV

Because by *one sacrifice* He has <u>made perfect forever</u> [POOF!] those who are <u>being</u> <u>made holy</u>. [BUMP. BUMP.] – Hebrews 10:14 NIV

This one little Scripture reminds us that we *better be* walking the talk, while it removes the *guilt* and *shame* and *self-condemnation* that comes from *failing* in our attempts. However, this is a *dangerously* comforting verse, because it's easy to ignore our part in the "being made" process.

Therefore be imitators of God as dear children. – Ephesians 5:1 NKJ



We know and rely on the love God has for us. God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in him. In this way, love is made complete among us so that we will have confidence on the day of judgment, because in this world we are like Him. – 1 John 4:16-17 NIV



Not perfectly by any stretch, but considered perfect while being made holy, by committing to applying what we currently can, and practicing to strengthen (to eventually achieve), what we currently can't. The secret is to never settle for whatever level of renewal we currently have. And to make every effort to become a genuine imitation.

Paul's Greco-Roman audience would've been stunned that he says to "offer our bodies". They regarded the body as something God didn't want. It's aging, blotchy, achy ... wrinkled ... I can never remember all seven dwarves! That's the reason for their obsession with idealizing the human form to "godlike" perfection. But then, didn't God demand spotless, flawless, sacrifices? Yes, but that was for sin, and that was accomplished in Christ. Ours isn't a sacrifice for sin, but for righteousness. Paul made this quite clear, six chapters earlier, saying to:

Offer *yourselves* to God, as those who have been *brought* from death to life; and *offer* the parts of your *body* to Him as instruments of *righteousness*. – Romans 6:13 NIV

We're not earning forgiveness. We're confirming our faith, as "true and proper worship". That's why Paul says our life must be, "holy" (which simply means set apart) to please our Father. And what pleases Him is to be all in when it comes to being set apart. A lot of people want to serve God, but only as advisors! Know why? They're chicken. But, look how Paul begins Romans.

Paul, a <u>bond-servant</u> of Christ Jesus, [A bond-servant is a *slave* who so *loves* their *lord* that they *choose* a *lifetime commitment* of service *after* being set *free*] called as an apostle, [and] set apart for the *Gospel* [literally: the Good News] of God, which He *promised* beforehand *through* His prophets *in* the holy Scriptures, [wherein we renew our *minds*] concerning His Son, – Romans 1:1-3 NAS



Notice that Paul doesn't say he was "<u>set apart</u>" from something, but "<u>for</u>" something (for the Good News of God's Son). When I married Shar, 39 years ago, I wasn't thinking about all the women I was being separated from; the only thing on my mind was the one I was willingly, eagerly, gratefully, joyfully being separated for, and joined, through the bond of matrimony, to.



Last Sunday I said that *you* are the joy that was set before Jesus, for which reason He *endured* the *cross*. (Heb 12:2) And He must be the joy set before *you*, for which reason *you* will endure hardship as discipline (i.e. training) as His children. (Heb 12:7) And by far, the biggest ongoing disciplinary hardship of the Christian life is dying to self. And I ended the message asking you to imagine a firefighter unwilling to enter a burning building. That's not a firefighter. And then imagine a child of God, who claims to follow Jesus, but is unwilling to lay down their life, as a living sacrifice, to bring the light of Christ to a dark world. What's that? Well, if you find yourself continually looking back and returning to your former, worldly ways, I would respectfully suggest that you see yourself as having been set apart from rather than for. And that's a recipe for remaining in the darkness of death in spite of the Light of life around you.





[Jesus] said, "I am the Light of the world. Whoever follows Me will never walk in darkness [i.e. hard hearted hatred], but will have the Light of life." – John 8:12 NIV

[So] If we claim to have fellowship with Him yet walk in the darkness [of death], we lie and do not live by the truth. – 1 John 1:6 NIV

Anyone who *claims* to be *in* the *light* but *hates* a brother or sister is *still* in the *darkness* ... and walks around in the *darkness* ... darkness has *blinded* them. – 1 John 2:9-11 NIV

Woe to those ... who put darkness for light and light for darkness, - Isaiah 5:20 NIV

If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness! - Matthew 6:23 NIV



Ever heat a TV dinner in the microwave, sit down to enjoy it, and then bite in only to find that, though nice and *hot* on the *outside*, it's still *frozen* on the inside? I *hate* that. So does the *Lord*, in a sense. **Our Father hates half-baked faith.**



That's when we're nice and warm and "Christiany" on the *outside*, while a part of our heart, hiding inside, remains frozen. A murderous *heart* is *dangerous*, because it's easy to *justify* and *ignore* a frozen core under a top layer of warmth.

Here's a great little riddle that Jesus poses to the religious posers concerning sacrifices.



Which is greater, the <u>aift</u> or the <u>altar</u> that <u>sanctifies</u> the <u>gift?</u> – Matthew 23:19 NKJ

For by one <u>offering</u> [or, "sacrifice" (NIV)] He has perfected forever those who are being <u>sanctified</u>. [or, "being made holy" (NIV)] – Hebrews 10:14 NKJ

[You see] We have an <u>altar</u> from which those who minister at the <u>tabernacle</u> have <u>no right</u> ... [Jesus] suffered [on a <u>cross</u>] outside the city gate to make the people holy through His own blood. Let <u>us</u>, then, go to <u>Him outside</u> the camp, bearing the <u>disgrace</u> [of the cross] He bore. ... Through <u>Jesus</u>, therefore, let <u>us</u> [as a kingdom of <u>priests</u> (Rev 5:10) continually offer to God a [<u>living</u>] <u>sacrifice</u> of praise—the <u>fruit</u> [the <u>produce</u>, the <u>result</u>, the <u>actions</u>] of lips that openly profess His name. And do not <u>forget</u> to <u>do good</u> and to <u>share</u> with <u>others</u>, for with such [<u>loving</u>, thus <u>living</u>] sacrifices [of <u>true</u> and <u>proper</u> worship] God is <u>pleased</u> ... and may He <u>work</u> in <u>us</u> what is <u>pleasing</u> to <u>Him</u>, through Jesus Christ, — Hebrews 13:10-15 NIV

[Jesus said] "You are the light of the world. ... let your light [of love] shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven. ... [You have heard that] anyone who murders will be subject to judgment. But I tell you that anyone who is angry with a brother or sister will be subject to judgment. ... And anyone who says, 'You fool!' will be in danger of the fire of hell. Therefore, if you are offering your gift [i.e. sacrifice] at the altar and there remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your [half-baked] gift [of love for God] there in front of the altar. [God doesn't want a sacrifice that "remains in death"] First go and be reconciled to them; [as much as possible on your part; because, it's not enough to just love the Lord; we must also love others as He loves us] then come and offer your [loving, thus living, thus true and proper, thus pleasing] gift. ... Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven." – Matthew 5:14-16, 21-24, 44-45 NIV

[Just before the cross, Jesus said] "As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are My disciples," – John 13:34-35 NIV

"This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be My disciples. ... My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you." – John 15:8, 12 NIV

Our Father isn't pleased with half-hearted efforts. But **He sure gets a** *kick* **out of whole-hearted attempts that fall** *flat* **on their** *face!* Bump. Bump. Bump. Practice! Practice!

My little children, I write this to you so that you will *not* sin. But *if* anybody *does* sin, we have an advocate with the Father—Jesus Christ, the Righteous One. ... Whoever says, "I know Him," but does not do what He *commands* is a liar, ... This is how we *know* we are *in* Him: Whoever claims to *live in* Him must *live as* Jesus *did*. ... because the darkness is passing and the true light [of *life* and *love*] is already shining. —1 John 2:1-10 NIV

You in? All in? OT sacrifices died for man's sin. But us? We're called to live for God's glory, as visible proof of His great mercy! So look alive and put it on display! You are alive ... right?
