
Acts of Gad

*The Good, the Gad, and the Smugly*June 12, 2022



Today we're learning how to be more wrong, to be more noble.



So, are you ready to be wrong? We hate being wrong; and we're really bad at it. Ever defend something right, and after the fight realize it's wrong? And you need to admit it? Ain't that the worst?! Why is that? Well sadly, we're more concerned about being right than knowing truth. It's part of the pride package that comes standard with our model. Admitting we're wrong is often our last resort, when it should be our first resort.



So we need to develop an expectation of routinely being wrong. It's the secret of peace and joy and nobility. And it's the reason the smugly religious led their nation to annihilation despite the prophets, John the Baptist, and Jesus.



We've been reconstructing the story of the famously, formerly possessed, miracle-working Gadarene – Jesus' first apostle, and commissioned by Christ to spread the Good News of the power and authority of the Jewish Savior of the world to the pagans across the pond, by casting out demons in His name, in the Decapolis. Matthew says this guy's east-side story is fulfilling Isaiah's shining light, rising across the Sea of Galilee, (Mt 4:15-16; 12:15-21) even as Jesus, the Light of the World, shares His own west-side story of grace and mercy and impending doom. And according to the boys, (Mk 9:38; Lk 9:48) good ol' Gad was going strong up north, when they were opposed by him, and then rebuked by Jesus, for ignorantly, unsuccessfully, attempting to curtail his mission.















He's Jesus' star in the east, (Dan 12:3) sent to single-handedly establish ... us, the Gentile body of Christ, while Jesus is teaching and taming His own on the wild west-side. And whether Gad knew it or not, Jesus went and sent, to prepare a place to keep Jewish believers safe during the much-prophesied destruction and desolation that was coming – in 70^{AD} – to the Temple, Jerusalem, and every synagogue in the land – when every Jew was either killed, committed suicide, or was enslaved, sold, and scattered around the globe. But those the Good Shepherd had led, fled the Promised Land to the land promised by Jesus, back across the Jordan where OT Jesus/Joshua had led 'em in, to get to the mountains of Bashan, where the people of Pella had been prepared by Gad to receive and protect them. By the way, Gad's name is actually pronounced "god". Seriously. And appropriately. As Jesus said to the smugly religious, more concerned about being "right" than being saved:

"Is it not written in your Law, '<u>I said</u>, you are gods'? If He called them gods to whom the Word of God came—and <u>Scripture cannot be broken</u>— do you say ... 'You are blaspheming,' because I said, 'I am the Son of God'?"—John 10:34-36 ESV

The Bible's defining feature is its God-breathed perfection. Yet ironically, over 200 published, admittedly-self-contradictory, Gospel "harmonies" have woven Jesus' stories into various agenda driven concoctions that serve to strengthen the claims against His credibility — cuz you can't violate the big rule: "Scripture cannot be broken". And it don't need fixin'! We do. I've been weaving the Word for nine years now. And many of you keep asking when I'll be finished. When it's perfect. I'm not about to settle for just being guesswork #201. But it's getting there. And I can see how it'll serve as forensic proof of the inspiration and infallibility of all Scripture. And before you say, "That's great, but I don't need proof I know it's perfect," take a look what Paul said to the Thessalonians.

[We] thank God *continually* because, when *you received* the Word of God, which you *heard* from *us*, *you accepted* it not as the word of *men*, but as it *actually* is, the Word of *God* [They *must've* been *pleased* with *that* ... *until* they read *this*] – 1 Thessalonians 2:13 NIV

Now the *Bereans* were of *more noble character* than the *Thessalonians*, for they received the message with great eagerness and examined the Scriptures every day to see if what Paul said was true. – Acts 17:11 NIV

See the difference? The Thessalonians' based their hope on Paul's word. Which just isn't ... as noble. Whereas the Bereans substantiated their hope on God's Word. And that's called faith.

Now faith is the <u>substance</u> of things hoped for, the <u>evidence</u> of things not seen. For by it [the <u>substance</u> of <u>evidence</u>] the elders obtained a <u>good testimony</u>. – Hebrews 11:1-2 NKJ

You see, Thessalonians settle for secondhand hope. Whereas, Bereans seek the substance. Because, a good testimony requires seeing for yourself. So how noble is your character? Or should I ask: What's your hope based on? Tradition? Presumption? Emotion? Anxiety? Or pure, unadulterated truth? The Bereans examined the Scriptures to see if Paul was right, and just as importantly, where they were wrong. So often we turn to Scripture to support or defend our beliefs. So seldom to realign, recalibrate, and correct our views. You see, it's a milk vs. solid food thing.

For everyone who partakes *only* of *milk* is *unskilled* in the Word of *righteousness* ... – Hebrews 5:13 NKJ

[Even though, *literally*] All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness ... – 2 Timothy 3:16 NIV

[In fact] Blessed is the man whom God corrects ... – Job 5:17 NIV

For these commands are a *lamp*, this *teaching* is a *light*, and the <u>corrections of discipline</u> are <u>the way to life</u>, – Proverbs 6:23 NIV

[To put it bluntly] He who hates correction is stupid. – Proverbs 12:1 NIV

... <u>for he is a *babe*</u>. But solid food belongs to ... those who <u>by reason of use</u> have <u>their</u> senses <u>exercised to discern</u> both good and evil. – Hebrews 5:14 NKJ

[Isaiah asks] Whom shall He teach? ... [And answers] Them that are weaned from the milk ... [and weaving the Word] For precept must be upon precept, precept upon precept, line upon line, here a little and there a little. [Why] – Isaiah 28:9-10 KJ21

The whole vision has become to you like the words of a book that is sealed [Why?] – Isaiah 29:10-11 NKJ

[For the Lord] instructed me that I should ... <u>Bind up the testimony</u>, [and] <u>seal the law</u> among my disciples. [Why?] – Isaiah 8:11, 16 NKJ

I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lifted up ... Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying: "Whom shall I send" ... [Then I said] "Send me." And He said, "Go ... Make the heart of this people dull ... and shut their eyes;" [Why?] – Isaiah 6:1-10 NKJ

We are for signs and wonders in Israel from the Lord [Why?] – Isaiah 8:18 NKJ

[These are] rebellious people ... children who will not hear the law of the Lord; who say to the seers, "Do not see," and to the prophets, "Do not prophesy to us right things; [like: Read your Bible] speak to us smooth things" [like milk] – Isaiah 30:9-10 NKJ

Even after Jesus had done all these *miraculous signs* in their presence, they *still* would not *believe in* Him. This was to fulfill the Word of Isaiah the prophet: "Lord, who has *believed* our [sealed] message and to whom has the *Arm* of the Lord been *revealed*?" [Jesus said the Father "revealed them to babes" (who need *milk*) (Mt 11:25)] For this reason they could not believe, because, ["Anyone who does not receive the kingdom ... like a little child (being weaned) will never enter it" (Mk 10:15)] as Isaiah says *elsewhere:* "He has *blinded* their *eyes* and *deadened* their *hearts*, ["But as many as received Him ... He gave the right to become children of God" (ready for *solid food!*) (Jn 1:12); Know why?] ... Isaiah said this because he saw Jesus' glory and spoke about Him. – John 12:37-41 NIV







So, want to glorify Jesus? Find some of His glory for yourself! And you'll be excited to share it. Like when you go to a good restaurant, or a good movie, or find a good doctor. Now, a less-than noble might say: "But I don't need to examine it; I've already accepted it." Oh. Sorry, but you literally can't, if you haven't examined it for yourself. You've only accepted secondhand faith. Which is fine for new-reborns. But Rock-solid faith is based on substance, not intuition or tradition or presumption or a face-saving defense of apathy. A Thessalonian might say, "But, I don't have a problem with the Bible." That might be true but it's not the point; because the Bible has a problem with you. It's designed to bring you and me, to a point of decision on whether it should judge my brokenness, or if I should judge its. Cuz I'm the one that's in my own way — and that's an obstacle I can't move without seeking His help for myself in His Word. Know why "Scripture cannot be broken"?

Because "Every Word of God is flawless". (Prov 30:5) Especially if you hear a little, there – in your heart – a little. Our Father says, to: "Keep [My Words] within your heart; for they are life to those who find them." (Prov 4:20-22) And Jesus tells us that the only folks who'll find 'em, are those who'll seek 'em. Jesus used the Old Testament prophets to warn His followers exactly when to flee to escape death.

[Mark writes] "When you see 'the abomination that causes desolation' standing where it does not belong—let the reader understand—then ...flee to the mountains" – Mark 13:14 NIV

[Hey Matthew, the *reader* of *what?*] "When you *see* ... 'the abomination that causes desolation,' *spoken* of through the *prophet Daniel*" – Matthew 24:15 NIV

[Hey Luke, can you give us a hint?] When you see Jerusalem surrounded by armies, [which they were] then ... flee to the mountains, [which they did] ... For these [April-September, 70^{AD}] are the days of vengeance, [that Isaiah and oh-so-many others wrote about in the Old Testament, and are quoted about throughout the New] that all things which are written may be fulfilled. – Luke 21:19-22 NKJ

That's one of the treasures I'm tracking! By loading His Word into my heart, so I can get my ignorance and assumptions out of His way. Cuz I want to know which Scriptures He's referring to; cuz we can't finish weaving His Word, line-upon-line, without 'em! So my enquiring mind wants to know why He privately went on to say to Peter, James, and John, and Andrew, that:

²⁴ They will fall by the edge of the sword, [which 1.1 million did!] and be led away captive into all nations. [Which 97,000 were!] And Jerusalem will be trampled by Gentiles [which it was] ... [And] ²⁸ when these things begin to happen [which they did, just months before 70^{AD}] ... your redemption draws near. ... ³⁴ But take heed to yourselves, lest your hearts be weighed down with ... cares of this life, [rather than lightened by hope in His life] and that Day come on you unexpectedly. ... ³⁶ [Watch and pray] that you may be counted worthy to escape all these things" – Luke 21:24-36 NKJ

[And why did Peter later say] The time is near when all things will end. – 1 Peter 4:7 NCV

[And why'd James say] Behold, the Judge is standing at the door! – James 5:8-9 NKJ

[And why'd John say] It is the last hour ... we know that it is the last hour. – 1 John 2:18 NKJ

[And why'd Paul say] The Lord is at hand. – Philippians 4:5 NKJ

[And] What I mean, brothers, is that the time is short. – 1 Corinthians 7:29 NIV

[And why, shortly before 70^{AD} did the writer of *Hebrews* say to] Encourage one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching. – Hebrews 10:25 NIV



I'm so tired of reading how they were either confused or didn't mean what they said. Cuz, you don't get to say God's Word got it wrong! You only get to say you don't get it ... yet. I'm on the hunt to know if this is why that legion of Gad's demons asked Jesus if He'd come to torment them "before the time?" (Mt 8:29) And I see no reason we can't know.

"For there is nothing *hidden* that will not be disclosed, and nothing *concealed* that will not be known or brought out into the open. Therefore <u>consider carefully how you listen</u>. [Because] Whoever has [Truth] will be given more; [Truth] whoever does not have, [Truth] even what he thinks he has will be taken from him." – Luke 8:16-18 NIV

So I wanna *know* – *got'a* know – cuz I keep *finding,* again and again, that so much of what's been labeled as *error, archaic,* or *contradiction is* in *fact* just *reckless listening.* So you need to:

Guard what was committed to your trust, avoiding the ... <u>contradictions</u> of what is <u>falsely</u> called <u>knowledge</u> ... [by those who] <u>strayed</u> concerning the <u>faith</u>. – 1 Timothy 6:20-21 NKJ

Christianity is filled with people who believe what they believe because they believe it. But not us! Cuz we're going for something more noble! And maybe you're thinking, "But I don't know the Word of God at all." Take heart; remember: those Bereans weren't more noble for knowing, but for seeking, and refusing to settle, and for every day being ready to be wrong.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
