## Sincere Failures

Managing as Junior Shepherds October 23, 2022

Today we're talking about managing and tending to those entrusted to our care.



So, *do* you *care*? And *can* the Lord *trust* you? Or do you *shrug off* your *sin* against those you're to *tend*, as no big *deal*? Cuz *that's* what we tend to *do* if we're *full* of *our self* instead of *God's love*. We talked about how *bad waiters* make *others* wait on *them* – uncaringly *craving* to *be* served rather than *to* serve. But do you know why Jesus is called *the Chief Shepherd*? Because He *shepherds* His *junior shepherds*, like *Peter* who then urges *us* to:

Shepherd the flock of God which is among you, [How? By] serving as ... examples to the flock; and [then] when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory ... [so in the meantime we must] be submissive to one another, and be clothed with humility – 1 Peter 5:2-5 NKJ

[But] "Beware of *false* prophets, who *come* to you in <u>sheep's clothing</u>, but underneath are *ravenous wolves*." – Matthew 7:15 NAB

"He who is a *hired hand* and not a [*true*] *shepherd* ... sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep ... because he is a *hired hand* [just *in* it for what *he* can *get*] and <u>cares nothing for the sheep</u>." – John 10:12-13 ESV

"But <u>he who enters by the Door is a shepherd</u> ... This figure of speech Jesus spoke to them, but they did not understand ... [So Jesus said] "<u>I am the Door</u> ... if anyone enters through *Me*, he will be saved, and will go in and <u>out</u> [to lead] and find pasture. [to feed] – John 10:2, 6-9 NAS

"And the sheep *follow* him, for they *know* his voice. [That's you; His apprentice shepherds] ... I am the Good Shepherd." – John 10:4, 14 NKJ

The Good Shepherd is the Chief Shepherd of us junior shepherds of God's flock. We enter into a relationship with Him, through Him, and then we're sent out by Him to lead and feed those among us, who know us, don't fear us, and follow us as we follow Jesus. For example, Paul said:

Follow my example, as I follow the example of Christ. - 1 Corinthians 11:1 NIV

[Which means you need to] Keep watch over *yourselves* and all the flock of which the Holy Spirit has made *you overseers*. [So don't *abandon sheep!*] Be shepherds of the church of God, which He bought with His own blood. – Acts 20:28 NIV

The Shepherd's junior-shepherds are reflected in Jesus' story of the Master's *junior-master* who *falls asleep* when he's supposed to keep his fellow servants awake, eagerly waiting and watching for their master to return to serve them wedding-feast-food. And we ended with Jesus' warning.



If the [junior] master of the [Master's] house had known what hour the thief would come, he would have [stayed awake and] watched ... [So] be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect." [That's where we ended; but it's not where the story ends. It's just where Peter interrupts] Peter asked, "Lord, are you telling this parable to us, or to everyone?" The Lord answered, [in classic fashion with a question] "Who then is the faithful and wise [and sleepy] manager, whom the master puts in charge of his servants to give them their food allowance at the proper time? – Luke 12:39-42 NKJ

Which, in the *story* means keeping them *waiting* and *watching* for their true master and friend, till the second or third watch at 3:00 AM! (Lk 12:38) So Jesus says, "Who *is* a *faithful junior* servant? Tell Me, *Pete."* Cuz in *real* life (spoiler alert) it's gonna be *Pete!* 

But what about you? What are you doing to keep your sheep awake, alert, and eagerly waiting, or preparing, to open up to our one-of-a-kind Savior, Father, and Friend? Your flock being your family and friends and all who wander into your field of vision. "But I'm just a lil' lamb. I'm not ready." Oh. So maybe you're off the hook. Have you done foolish things? "Yes!" Weak things? "Yes!" Lowly things? "Yes! That's me!" Oops. You're back on the hook! Because:

God <u>chose the foolish things</u> of the world to shame the wise; God <u>chose the weak things</u> of the world to shame the strong. He <u>chose the lowly things</u> of this world and the <u>despised things</u> — ["But I'm still not ..."] and the <u>things that are not</u> — to nullify the things that are, so that no one may boast before Him. – 1 Corinthians 1:26-29 NIV

[Jesus goes on] Blessed is *that* [*junior-master*] servant [in *charge* of getting the others to *wait* to *eat* till the *proper time*] whom *his* master will find *so doing* when he *comes*. Truly, I say to you that he *will* make him *ruler* over *all* that he *has*. – Luke 12:43-44 NKJ



Which Jesus *does* when He *comes* to the *shore*, after He *rose*, to *eat* with His *apprentices*, and to ask Peter, *three times*, if he *truly* loves Him.

[Well then] Jesus said, "<u>Feed my lambs</u>." [Jesus said to the seventy-two, "I send you out as lambs among wolves." (Lk 10:3)] ... Jesus said, [to Peter] "<u>Take care of My sheep</u>." [He'd also said, "I have other sheep ... not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also." (Jn 10:16)] ... [And lastly] Jesus said, [to Peter] "<u>Feed My sheep</u>." [Jesus said to the Twelve, "I send you out as sheep among wolves." (Mt 10:16)] – John 21:15-17 NIV

But *Peter* isn't the *only* apostle hearing the *junior-servant* story that day. There's a *Judas* in the *flock*. And "he was a *thief;* as keeper of the *money* bag, he used to *take* from [it]", (Jn 12:6) cuz **His Master's** *money* was *his* master; cuz *that's* what *he* cared about. So Jesus *turns* and says:

But suppose the [junior-master] servant says to himself, 'My master is taking a long time in coming,' and he then begins to *beat* the menservants *and* maidservants and [Why?! Well, the *faithful* wanted to *wait;* while *he* wanted] to eat and drink and get drunk. [Matthew (24:49) adds: "with drunkards"; so he abuses the faithful and leads the vulnerable astray]

[So] The master of *that* [*junior-master*] *servant* will [later] come on a day when he does *not* expect him and at an hour he is *not* aware of. [And *catch* him *abusing* the *faithful and* his *authority; and*] He will cut *him* to *pieces* and assign him a place with the *unbelievers*. [YAY!] [*However*] That servant who [*follows* him; but] knows his [Chief] master's will and does not get ready or does not do what his [Chief] master wants will be beaten with many blows. [For *following* a *bad* junior shepherd when he knew *better*] But the one who does not know [*better;* and *follows* along] and does things *deserving* punishment will be beaten with *few* blows. [Point is: *everyone* takes a *beating* from the *leading* of a *self-serving* junior *shepherd*! And] From *everyone* who has been given much, [authority] much [*wisdom* and *faithfulness*] will be *demanded;* and from the *one* who has been entrusted with [those the master loves so] much, much more will be asked. – Luke 12:43-48 NIV





In the end, I think we'll beat *ourselves* up when we realize how we *failed* the *infinite, intimate love* of our *Creator-Father-Friend*. But **it's a** *parable,* **so it won't be an** *actual beating* ... *I'll bet.* But it *will be actual suffering.* The *third* time Peter *disowned* and *denied* Christ *publically* ...

The *rooster* crowed. [And] The Lord *turned* and looked *straight* at Peter. Then *Peter* ... went outside and *wept bitterly*. – Luke 22:60-62 NIV

Three days later, when Peter had to *face* Jesus *again*, what would he have given to go back and take a beating instead of what he *cock-a-doodle-did?* So the *good-news is:* we aren't really *beaten*. Bad news is: we'll probably *wish* we were. Ever know someone who threw a party at their *parents' house*, in their parents' *absence*, against their parents' *instructions?* Ever *been* that *person?* Well, *watch* yourself, or you could end up like the *selfserving junior master* who really went to *pieces* in the *end*. *Because:* 

The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it – Psalm 24:1 NIV

[So we better] Be devoted to one another ... serving the Lord. – Romans 12:10-11 NIV

Which can't be forced or manufactured and please Jesus; because the Chief doesn't want us junior-shepherding out of guilt, fear, or even obligation. It's gotta overflow from a heart full of appreciation. Cuz in the end, self-centered self-serving will reveal itself as the curse it really is.



So, Peter turns out to be the sleepy junior master whom Jesus puts in charge. But is *anyone* caught off guard *more* than *Peter* ... *other* than *Judas? No!* In fact, the night before the crucifixion, Jesus asks Peter, James, and John to *wait for* Him and *watch*, and returns to find them *sleeping* ... *three times!* Yet He *only* singles out *Peter*. (Mt 26:40)

"Simon," He said to Peter, "are you asleep? Could you not keep watch? ... [And] He again found them sleeping ... [And then] the third time, He said ... "The hour has come!" ... [And] Just as He was speaking, Judas [the thief] [appeared]. – Mark 14:37-43 NIV

And just the night before, Jesus had repeated this parable to them privately, with an addition.

If the [junior] master of the [Master's] house had known what *hour* the *thief* would *come*, he would have *watched* ...[So] *be ready*, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect ... in the *evening*, at *midnight*, at the *crowing* of the *rooster*, or in the *morning*—lest ... *He* find *you* sleeping. [And one *year* after Peter asked who He was talking to, Jesus says] And what I say to *you*, I say to *all: WATCH!*" – Mt 24:43-44; Mk 13:35-37 NKJ



And yet **Peter fails Him** so soon, and in so many ways. Jesus called Judas a demon; (Jn 6:70-71) but He called Peter, Satan! (Mt 16:23) So what's the big difference between Judas and Peter? It's all in the failing. At the Last Supper, Jesus says to Peter:

"Simon, Simon, Satan has asked to sift you as wheat. But I have prayed for you, Simon, that <u>your faith may not fail</u>. And <u>when you</u> <u>have turned back</u>, strengthen your brothers." But he replied, "Lord, I am ready to go with You to prison and to death." Jesus answered, "I tell you, Peter, before the rooster crows today, you will deny three times that you know Me." – Luke 22:31-34 NIV

You see, **our** *faith* **doesn't** *fail* **when** *we fail*. From *time* to *time* we *all* do *dumb stuff*. And we do *unloving things* to those we *most love*. However, **our** *faith* **only** *fails* **if** we *fail* to *turn back* **and** *undo* **them**. Peter's *behavior*, like the faithful, wise, but sleepy manager, was *often* off the *mark*, but *never* his *heart*. Whereas, **it** was Judas' *insincere*, *arrogant*, *self-serving heart* that *prevented* him from *repenting* and in the *end*, brought him *down* by stringing him *up*. Because:

The wicked are brought down by their own wickedness. – Proverbs 11:5 NIV

And his own counsel shall cast him down. - Job 18:7 KJ21



Judas didn't have the relationship to fall back on like Peter – who *literally* fell back on *Jesus* at the Last Supper to ask who was going to betray Him. (Jn 13:25) And it was only *after* the *fact* that the Lord's insincere junior-shepherd and self-serving money manager realized what a curse his self-serving success actually was.

Why do you think God *indelibly* linked Peter's *failure* to that rooster? Well, He's about to make Pete His junior-master, and *that* puffs up *pride*. So what better than a daily *wakeup* call, *literally*, to remind him to stay *humble* and *true*, and to keep watch over himself *and* his flock?

[Know why] [Jesus] emptied himself, taking the form of a servant – Philippians 2:7 RSV

## Because, you can't be a servant if you're full of yourself.

So let's take it from Jesus, and shepherd those He chose to graze on His grace in our field.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
