## Born To Die

What Was God Thinking?!

## Tonight we're going inside the mind of Christ!

But first, a Christmas question: What did God come down to do? Why would our Omnipotent Creator, take the plunge into a tiny, powerless, pool of amniotic fluid? Christmas is usually all about the birth; but we're going all the way back to the beginning of Jesus' earthly journey, when the Bread of Life was about to become a bun in the oven! Cuz, you gotta remember ...



He was in the form of God ... but made himself nothing, [which must've taken some doing!] taking the form of a servant, [and then] being born in the likeness of men. And [then] being found in human form, He humbled himself by becoming obedient to ... death on a cross. — Philippians 2:6-8 ESV



Which required Almighty God to *empty* himself and *separate* himself, so He could *humble* himself, and *serve* himself, like a *Father* and *Son*. Like when you *dream*; and you're *both* the *resting creator* as well as the *very image* of yourself *in* your creation. And the writer of *Hebrews* says that:



[God's] Son is ... the very image of His substance - Hebrews 1:3 WEB



So, what was the *All-knowing thinking* when He "<u>made himself nothing</u>"?! Know what? That writer of Hebrews found it, in Psalm 40. We won't find it on Christmas cards, or in pageants or programs or plays. Know why? It's dark. It's about sacrifice and death. Which is about as enticing as coal in your stocking. Not very Christmassy ... or rather, Clausemassy. Cuz frankly, they don't come any more Christmassy! But we'll build to it.



[For] When the time had fully come, [for the OT law to be fulfilled] God sent His Son, born of a woman, born under law, to redeem those under law – Galatians 4:4-5 NIV

Cuz the OT law required them to sacrifice innocent animals for sin, to make visible the invisible cost of wickedness, as an illustration and a foreshadow, not a solution. So when it had served its purpose, God himself made himself into a sinless sacrifice to satisfy the justice that reality itself demands, teeing up the most significant Christmas Scripture we never hear at Christmas:

For the law, having a shadow of the good things to come, and <u>not</u> the <u>very image</u> [that's God's Son] ... can never with these same sacrifices ... make those who approach perfect. ... For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and goats could take away sins. Therefore, when He came into the world, [When? Months before the manger. When He emptied himself, and separated himself] He said: "Sacrifice and offering You did not desire, but a body You have prepared for Me. ... Behold, I have come— in the volume of the book it is written of Me— to do Your will, O God." ... [And] By that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. — Hebrews 10:1-10 NKJ

I love how the Lord refers to the Bible as "the book". And think how *excited* that *writer* was when he found that in *Psalm 40!* Cuz it shows how *everything* was *building* to Jesus saying, "This'll be the body that'll carry Me to the cross for an end-all sacrifice for sin." And *then* something *akin* to, "Let's *do* this!" And *then* He made himself like *us*.



[In fact] In all things He had to be made like His brethren ... to make propitiation [a suitable and acceptable sacrifice] for [all] the sins of [all] the people. [For all time] – Hebrews 2:17 NKJ



Cuz perfect justice knows a good deal when it sees it. How many crushed Rolex watches, broken beyond repair, would you trade for one in mint condition? All of 'em! Which is why a perfect, sinless, Son of Man had more trade-in value than every broken human together. Ever.

For we do *not* have a High Priest who *cannot sympathize* with *our weaknesses*, [writes the writer of Hebrews] but One who *has* been tempted in *all* things as *we are*, [i.e. He didn't *cheat*] yet [was] without sin. [i.e. He didn't *fail*, as *we do*] — Hebrews 4:15 NAS

Which is why He had to be "made like [us]" "in all things". Originally, "God made man in His own likeness" (Gen 1:26 NLV) but then we sinned. So our Creator "made himself ... in [ours]". (Phil 2:7)


Since the children have flesh and blood, He too shared in *their humanity* so that by His death He might destroy him who holds the power of death – Hebrews 2:14 NIV



The crucifixion isn't just part of the Christmas story, it's the reason for it. The "reason for the season" is His birth; but the reason for His birth is His death. He was quite clear about it, saying:



"The Son of Man did *not come* to *be* served, but <u>to serve</u>, and <u>[not to take, but]</u> to <u>give His life</u>" – Matthew 20:28 NIV



"I lay down My life—only to take it *up* again. ... I have *authority* to lay it *down* and *authority* to take it *up* again." – John 10:17-18 NIV



Cuz the story doesn't *end* with the *sacrifice*. Jesus was sent to conquer death itself. Which He *did*. But *that's* the *Easter* story. Jesus *came* to the *manger* to *get* to the *cross* – to surrender His sinless human self to save *all sinners* of *all sin* for *all time*. And *this* we *do* find on *Christmas cards*, and in *pageants* and *programs* and *plays*. Because, *Joseph* was *commanded* to:

Give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins. ... and *they* will call Him *Immanuel* (which means God with us). – Matthew 1:21-23 NIV

Nativity scenes should be *lit* in the *light* of a *cross*. Cuz *that's* why God came *down*. But, is it just me, or does that standard-issue nativity star *look* like a *cross* with the end of a manger on it? So, now we *know* what was on God's *mind* the *moment* just before He dove in: *You*. But if you know much about Him, you probably could've *guessed that*. So let's give *ourselves away*, in His honor, and *live* in a *way* that says, "We're part of His *body!*" What do you *say?* Let's *do* this!
