In Good Time

Expedited Answers to Impatient Prayer

Today we're talking about practicing... patience. Is there anything more frustrating?! Well, hang on to how you feel – cuz that's gonna help you answer this question more honestly: How long are you willing to wait on the Lord? Would you wait till tomorrow for a prayer prayed today? Well I hope so! That's faster than Amazon!



But do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a *day* is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day.

Wait – does that mean tomorrow's answer to today's prayer might take another millennium?! Or, does that mean He can answer a thousand years of prayer today alone? Well, both. But – either way:

The Lord is *not slow* in keeping His promise, as *some understand* slowness. Instead He is *patient* with you, *not* wanting anyone to perish, but *everyone* to come to repentance. – 2 Peter 3:8-9 NIV

He's not slow, He's patient? How does that work? Cuz I'd like to go back and have my gym grade changed — I may have had the most patient mile time in sixth grade history! Just how does patience nullify slowness? Well, there's a difference between time and timing. Something's time means how long it takes to happen; its duration. While something's timing means when it happens; its beginning. And we call fast time 'quick' and fast timing 'soon'. And the Bible makes it clear God gets things done quickly and soon. Jesus, Himself reminds us how God works at the end of the persistent widow parable:

I tell you, He will see that [His people] get justice, and <u>quickly</u>. [that's His time] However, <u>when</u> the Son of Man comes [that's His timing], will He find faith on the earth? – Luke 18:8 NIV

Good question. Depends on when that *is*. But if He wants everyone to come to repentance, a time with faith on the earth would be the right time. And if there's a right time, then there's also a wrong time; y'know, when it's too soon or not soon enough! But if, like He says, God's committed to giving us what we need, when we need it so we can be saved – well, we can absolutely know: God does everything as soon as possible! He can't be early or late; He has to be right on time.

You see, at just the right time ... Christ died for the ungodly. – Romans 5:6 NIV

So no, God's not slow; He's on time – and slow would mean running late. But make no mistake, He is willing to patiently postpone all He has promised until the timing is perfect. So when it comes to our prayer, we should trust that every answer is on its way, with no delay, and will arrive as soon as possible. But He'll wait a thousand years if necessary. The question is, will you?

NO! I DON'T WANT TO! AND I CAN'T WAIT 1000 YEARS FOR GOD TO ANSWER MY PRAYERS!

Well, I hate to break it to you, but you might have to. As soon as possible is as fast as fast can go. I mean, it's as soon as possible – meaning God's already exhausted every opportunity to expedite the process! The only way to move up His timing would be for us to make them possible sooner. And how can we know when one of our prayers is possible? Well:

This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that *if* we ask anything <u>according to His</u> <u>will</u>, He hears us. And if we know that He hears us—whatever we ask—we know that we have what we asked of Him. [It's no longer a matter of *if*, but *when*] – 1 John 5:14-15 NIV

Remember that? Praying according to His will is what assures an answer is possible! You do that and you've got the guaranteed power of God behind each and every prayer you produce.



So do you? It's really hard to tell; especially for self-centered sinners like us who like to paint our portraits a little prettier than we are in person. I mean, just look at your profile pics! Well, our prayers 'aint much better... But if we do take an honest look at our prayers, we can find the line that divides and decides what's possible for God to grant.



Cuz at their core, prayers are either patient or pouting. And there's an easy way to tell them apart: patient prayer means you're willing to wait for what God wants while pouting prayer means you're wanting God to grant your will. And if you put your prayers under that microscope, it's surprising how few prayers are fully free of pouting.

But here's the good news: you're in control! And in fact, the path to patience is paved with control; the most powerful control, the kind of control that gets God to answer your prayers... self control. "Boo! You tricked us, that's not good news! Self-control takes work and it's no fun!" Well hang on, I'm not done, it's also means exercising power — power that you control—the kind of power that can change God's plans! "Oh. I bet its willpower. Like how he tricked us with self control"

No, and *stop interrupting*; this is where things start to get appealing. Cuz let's be honest, we all know willpower doesn't really work. Not for humans! **We're defined by our weak-will:**

The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak. - Mark 14:38 NIV

We can't just decide to do what we know we should and deny doing what we know we shouldn't; otherwise we'd all be successful, healthy, geniuses who never gave in to our undisciplined desires. But does that sound like anyone you know? Of course not, because as humans; we prefer fleeting fancies over lofty goals. Forget whether they're good for us or not, they're easy to attain and always ready and waiting for us. And because of how our heart handles desire, that's exactly the way we like 'em!

And back in an annoyingly intellectual 19th c. sermon aptly titled, "The Expulsive Power of a New Affection" Thomas Chalmers gives a great explanation of why willpower won't work as the force behind our self-control. We can't just shut down what we want; the heart's too powerful! He says:

It is quite in vain to think of stopping one of these pursuits in any way else, but by stimulating to another.

Simply put, human hearts can't be empty. Because a heart that wants nothing suffers the ultimate pain of apathy and hopelessness. And we'll do anything to prevent that pain. So because the human heart needs to be filled with a desire, we can't just will it empty of its wants – we can only exchange them for others. And it's because we're ruled by our wants that we're warned:

Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it. – Proverbs 4:23 NIV

Willpower fails. But, wantpower wins. And that means that it isn't willpower that changes us. It's wantpower. And therefore, it's our foolish flesh that gets to call the shots. But that's wonderful news! Because we also have a dose of God's Spirit to outwit the nitwit we have in the flesh; we just have to work with Him to convince our human hearts to make God's will what we want. Cuz here's the big secret: self-control is not about repressing desire but replacing it.

The whole trick to changing our will is changing our want. Because then, we'll willingly do the things that serve our want – like the animal our flesh is! Take Jacob and the years of labor he was willing to work because of his wantpower:



Jacob served seven years to get Rachel, but they seemed like only a few days to him because of his love for her. – Genesis 29:20 NIV

Seven years of work seemed like a few days?! That's the *effect* of wantpower! So imagine if I set my heart on God in the same way; could we get *this* story: "Noah served his whole life to get to God, but it seemed like only a couple weeks because of his love for Him." Absolutely! So how do we get our heart to want the Lord's will? Well, that's the easy part, cuz your heart's a pushover!

I learned *that* in seventh grade! Because one day at *lunch*, a group of yo-yo enthusiasts had been booked to put on a small show and though I had *zero* opinions about yo-yos that *morning*, I was *obsessed* by the early *afternoon!* I needed one now! I *begged* for the money, started practicing every day and hung out with the new yo-yo *group* at school every opportunity I had! And you know *why?* Our heart is always ready to want – it just needs an opportunity! And *anyone* can provide it! That's what *Apple* did in 2007 when *it* convinced your heart that *it* wanted an iPhone more than *anything* in life – even though you'd never *once* heard of such a thing!

And we all have that very same power; so why not sell yourself on God's will!

Here's the first pitch: "If we want God's will above all else, He will absolutely answer every one of our prayers!" Pretty enticing, right? But more than yo-yos and iPhones? Well, we'll see – because how you live reveals who's winning the war of wants in your heart.



Everyday they compete and everyday the rankings change. Tonight's matchup: A good night's sleep v. Finishing that Netflix series; and don't miss tomorrow's *title* fight: Money v. Integrity! So if we want God's will to take the top spot sooner than later – well, we gotta fix the fight!

And that means being more impressive than a gang of yo-yo hipsters and more appealing than every Apple ad. We gotta sell our heart on the stuff in God's will that all our *other* wants can't offer. We gotta steal our heart's attention and wow it into wanting nothing else. And all that takes is a glimpse of God's glory! Good thing:

[God] made His light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ. - 2 Corinthians 4:6 NIV



Because seeing Jesus as the glory in God's will, makes a pretty good case for wanting that will! Cuz here's the new pitch you get to make to yourself, "If we want God's will above all else, we become perfect. Oh yeah — and we don't die!" And as we saw a couple weeks ago, every minute of facetime that we spend with someone draws us deeper into love.

So the whole strategy to keep our heart set on God's will is as simple as spending time with Him.

I had a great thing going with God; Bible was *fun*, prayer felt *positive*, and I noticed some real personal *growth*. **But then I got busy and** *God* **got distant.** So I *asked* God to help me find some time. But then, one particularly packed day, after dropping my girls at *school* and after my half-hour commute to the *church*, I realized I'd left my computer at *home*. And I got *mad*. At *God*. I mean, here I am *trying* to do my part and get things *done* for the *right* reasons but *God* sure 'aint making it any easier! And it wasn't until I started on my angry way *back* home that it *hit* me: *this* was the *only* possible way God could carve an hour out of my busy day for just the *two* of *us*.

He found a way for our facetime while I was letting weaker wants win. I was the one making things impossible! So I apologized and said, "I love You." And we talked about family and the concerns I had and on the way back to the church, we listened to the Bible. And the whole week, I just felt the fullness of my heart and the foolishness of my flesh.

I had to learn what we all heard last Sunday: we don't pray to get God to do our will, but to let Him use us, and teach us, and change us, as we learn to trust His will. So why not make things a little easier on yourself by reminding your heart just how much you want what He has planned for you. And then pray about it, trusting that it's on its way as soon as possible; and will arrive in good time.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
