Opened Minds *Atheists, Agnostics, and Apostles*

Today we're *opening* our *minds* – and *appreciating Noah's* 4-part *testimony* of *how* the Lord *led* him from "the *dark* side of the *force*" to the *light*. But first: **Do you have an** *open mind*?











And what's that even mean? I really enjoy Noah's perspective, cuz he makes atheists far less intimidating and un-relatable and far more lovable and pitiable, by allowing us to see how much they dislike so much of what they have to believe (like a life devoid of purpose, significance, and hope in the face of death), in order to not believe in God, ... in order to be their own god. Which is a trade so often made down here. Because it's the same ol' garden variety sin of rebellion that we've all shared since, well, the garden.

When I told Noah what I was speaking on, he told me a story about the two of us that I don't remember. In one of our *early interactions,* he came to me with some *frustrating*, seemingly *contradictory* Scripture – and *apparently rather* than try to dispel his concern, or sell him a half-baked answer or a strained rationalization, or a well-reasoned apologetic, or fall back on blind faith, I said: "You think that's bad!?" And then proceeded to pile on three additional problems that were worse than his. And he said he was attracted to the honesty of hitting the problem head on with the excitement that comes from the *confidence* that there absolutely is an answer to be *had*. And by simply identifying the challenge, we were well on the way to solving it! And since then, he said he's found troves of answers he wouldn't have even thought to dig for. Cuz this is a place where we're always seeking to enrich our grasp of God and His Word. Because, 1) "For now we see in a mirror, dimly" and "know in part" (as we men are reminded in the restroom mirror); and, 2) There's a perfect understanding yet to come to those seeking, which is when "that which is in *part* will be *done away*"; (1 Cor 13:10-12) and 3) That's why:

We are not *peddlers* of God's Word like so many; but in Christ we speak as persons of *sincerity*, as persons *sent* from *God* and *standing* in His *presence*. -2 Corinthians 2:17 NRS

And *He* demands *perfect honesty* via *humility*. It's funny, but it's one of the *few ways* we can be *perfect* in *His* eyes – by *admitting* our *imperfect* and *incomplete understanding*. Rather than *dogmatically defending debated doctrines* as though we now know *perfectly*, and *not* in *part*.

Just look how Jesus' testimony is broken into parts and pieces and scattered among the four Gospels and several epistles. There's been about 200 failed, yet published, attempts to perfectly harmonize their parts. And with all this talk on atheism, I took a nostalgic look back on our old pal Dan Barker, the polar opposite of Noah: a pastor turned atheist who, in his Empty Tomb Challenge, defied anyone to perfectly synchronize the various parts of the resurrection.

And yet, quoting Thomas Pain, Dan writes: "I lay it down as a position which cannot be [refuted or challenged] ... first, that the agreement of all the parts of a story does not prove that story to be true, because the parts may agree and the whole may be false; secondly, that the disagreement of the parts of a story proves the whole cannot be true." Funny, how that works in favor of Dan's agenda: contradiction proves Scripture false; and perfect harmony proves a conspiracy. Dan don't have an open mind. Because, like so many of us, Dan is a cheater – cheating himself and others into thinking he has an open mind while rigging an unwinnable challenge. Like so many, Dan isn't seeking truth, but subconsciously suppressing it. First and foremost from himself. Like the men Paul describes:

Men who *suppress* the *truth* by their wickedness, since what *may* be *known* about God is *plain* to them, because God has *made* it *plain* to them ... so that men are without *excuse*. ... their *thinking* became *futile* and their *foolish hearts* were *darkened*. Although they *claimed* to be *wise*, they became *fools* – Romans 1:18-22 NIV



And you gotta pity a fool, as frustrating as they may be, because they've barred the door of their heart to even the *possibility* of a *truth outside* of themselves. Unlike an agnostic who's open to the possibility of God, but leans on the self-invalidating, circular-logic of "I know that nobody can know anything", atheism is an emotionally charged philosophy. It's an irrational expression of aggression against a nonexistent God. It's a type of grand spiritual tantrum. When someone tells me they're an atheist, I like to say, "I don't believe it." And I ask them to draw a *circle*. I now present: How to Turn an Honest Atheist Into an Open Agnostic. 1) Ask them to draw a circle to represent all the knowledge and ultimate truth of every dimensional universe known and unknown. We'll use a photo of galaxies as a background; the field of vision here being the equivalent to a dime at 75'. 2) Ask them to draw a circle inside that circle, to represent how much of it they currently possess. This much? This much? 3) Point to the space outside of their own limited circle, and ask if there's possibly room out there for a God they don't yet know or understand. And if they say anything like yes or maybe, let 'em know they're an *agnostic*, not an *atheist*. And once an atheist admits they're an agnostic, it's a slippery slope to Christianity! But remember, you'll never argue anyone into faith. All we can do is shine a light, poke some pinholes in faulty, futile logic, and hope the truth that gets in grows.

Archaeologists, anthropologists, and missionaries have never discovered a civilization of atheists. There's a universal desire to worship ... something. And know what else we all share? The violation of the conscience. Atheists try to avoid it by eliminating God. But there's a universal moral compass, and a universal nature to deviate from it – even among Jesus' closest companions and apostles. In fact, the day Jesus rose, He rebuked nearly every one of 'em!

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, [after hearing all the accounts that Jesus did what He said He'd do] with the doors locked for fear of the Jews, [rather than opened and waiting expectantly for fear of the Lord] Jesus came and stood among them [in spite of their locked doors] and said, "Peace be with you!" After He said this, He showed them His hands and side. [Why?] – John 20:19-20 NIV

[Cuz He had to! Because] When Jesus rose ... He appeared first to Mary Magdalene ... She went and told those who had been with Him ... When they heard that Jesus was alive and that she had seen Him, they did not believe it. Afterward Jesus appeared in a different form to two of them ... These returned and reported it to the rest; but they did not believe them either. Later [with doors locked for fear of the Jews] Jesus appeared to the Eleven <u>as they were eating</u>; He rebuked them for their <u>lack of faith</u> [eating without Him] and their <u>stubborn refusal to believe</u> those who had seen Him after He had risen. – Mark 16:9-14 NIV



You see, the *predisposition* of the *heart* determines the *openness* of the *mind*. Noah and I share a love for one the most *famous former atheists:* C.S. Lewis. Here are two little know *quotes* that I just love: "Sometimes it would just be very convenient if Christianity were *not* true." and "Now that I'm a Christian, I do have moods in which the whole thing looks very improbable; but when I was an atheist, I had moods in which Christianity looked terribly probable." And when Noah *first* started *working* here, I told him about this *time* I wanted to know C.S. Lewis' *view* on a *specific troubling Scripture*, but he never *wrote* about it.

And I prayed for wisdom. And a man approached *me* on Sunday morning and said his *aunt* had kept a personal *correspondence* with C.S. Lewis, and he thought I might like to see their *letters*. Which I did. And to my amazement, this guy's aunt *asked* about *that* Scripture ... and C.S. Lewis *answered* my question! And I told Noah how I wanted to tell the guy how much it meant to me. I could remember our conversation, and his height, and his build, and his affability – but for the *life* of me, I couldn't *picture* his *face*, and it was *killing* me. Know the *punchline*? It was *Noah*.

[Now] Jesus *himself* ... said to them, "*Peace* be with you." [But instead of glorifying God and laughing with relief] They were *startled* and *frightened*, thinking they saw a *ghost*. [Cuz, like their locked room, they weren't open to the Truth. So] He said to them, "<u>Why are you troubled</u>, and <u>why do doubts rise in your minds</u>? Look at My *hands* and My *feet*. ... *Touch* Me and *see*" – Luke 24:36-39 NIV

How sad. But then, in their *defense*, this is *fairly unprecedented*. But in their *prosecution*, just three nights earlier, after the Last Supper, on their way to the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus said:

"I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. Before long, the world will not see Me anymore, but you will see Me. ... All this I have spoken while still with you. ... <u>My</u> <u>peace I give you</u>. [Which is why He says, "Peace be with you" when He shows up in their midst] ... <u>Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid</u>. [Which is why He said, "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts rise in your minds?" Cuz just three nights earlier He confirmed that] You heard Me say, 'I am going away and I am coming back to you.' ... I have told you now [just three nights] before it happens, so that when it does happen you will believe." – John 14:18-29 NIV

But, just *three* nights later, their *hearts*, like their *doors*, were *closed* to the *possibility* of a *truth outside* of themselves. *Dan* demands *truth* on *his* terms. So did *they*. Do *you*? **Dan's only willing** to *go* where the truth *leads*, as *long* as it *leads* to where *he* wants to *go*. Are we any *different*? I sure *hope* so. I'm not *picking* on poor ol' *Dan*; I suspect we have *more* in *common* than *not*.

He asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" They gave Him a *piece* of broiled fish, and He *took* it and *ate* it in their *presence*. He said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about Me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms." Then <u>He opened their minds</u> so they could *understand* the *Scriptures.*" – Luke 24:36-45 NIV



The Good News is: Jesus ignores locked doors if there's a chance of reception inside. So what's it mean to have an open mind? It means to have an opened mind, to all the truth outside ourselves, which is something only Jesus can do ... because, He has a monopoly on truth. Which is found in His Word. Which we're commanded to store up in our heart. Draw a circle to represent all the truth the Lord has tried to get into your mind and heart (through His Word, His Spirit, your conscience, and others). Now draw a circle inside it, to represent the amount of truth you've actually received. And by received, I mean responded to and put into practice. This much? This much? This much? Once a believer admits they're need to receive, it's a slippery slope to maturity! We can't open our own minds to anything but futility, foolishness, and hopeless darkness. But, we can renew our minds with truth on God's terms, by opening our heart to following it wherever it leads. So, why did Jesus eat their leftover fish? To show 'em He's not a ghost? No. That's why He had 'em touch Him. The significance isn't the eating, but the serving. Cuz He'd warned 'em:

"It will be good for those servants whose master finds them watching when he comes. I tell you the truth, *he* ... will have *them* recline at the table and will *come* and *wait* on *them*. It will be good for those servants whose master finds them ready ... because the *Son* of *Man* will *come* at an hour when *you* do not expect *Him*." – Luke 12:35-41 NIV

Jesus hadn't let the gates of hell or death itself stop Him from keeping His Word and coming to serve! The only thing that stopped Him, was their closed hearts and minds. And so, when He came, and they'd eaten without Him; doors locked; backs turned; and debating and disputing those who'd seen Him, and were sent to prepare 'em, He looked over the leftovers and ...

He asked *them*, "Do *you* have anything [*left*] here to eat?" *They* gave *Him* a *piece* of broiled *fish*, and [*instead* of *serving*] <u>He *took* it</u> and <u>ate it</u> in *their* presence. – Luke 24:36 NIV

Imagine the *awkward silence*. Welcome *back*, Jesus. *Got'a love us!* You can be a witness of everything Jesus has done; but **if your heart isn't unlocked and wide open, filled with His Word**, **and surrendered on** *His* **terms**, **you will** *cheat yourself* **out of being served by** *Jesus Himself*. But *finally*, on His *third appearance*, they *were* waiting and watching, at the Sea of Galilee, and:

Jesus said to *them*, *"Come* and have *breakfast."* ... [And] Jesus *came*, *took* the *bread* and [this time] *gave* it to *them*, and did the *same* with the *fish*. [*But*] This was now the *third* time Jesus appeared to His disciples after He was raised from the dead. – John 21:12-14 NIV

Cuz, if we won't open our heart, He can't come and serve ... and open our mind. As He himself said:

"Everyone on the side of truth [at least] listens to Me." – John 18:37 NIV

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
