Balancing Authority and Intimacy

Today we honor our dads and our Father!

Ever project your down-here dad onto your up-there Father? It's common. It's normal. And it's a problem that needs to be wrestled with by each of us ... with our Father's help. Which is where Jesus comes in with the Lord's Prayer which, contrary to popular belief and long standing tradition, isn't a prayer. It's a prayer guide. A prayer pattern. A prayer generator. A prayer memory aid. Because Jesus didn't teach His boys "what" to pray, but "how" to pray. Cuz the boys didn't say, "Teach us a prayer." but, "Teach us to pray." (Lk 11:1)







Cuz they'd been raised to recite the **Amidah**, an 18-part, 10-minute, thricedaily, beautiful, Scriptural, but mind-numbingly mechanical prayer. And so, **Jesus didn't** *pray* **the Lord's Prayer**, **He** *taught* **it** – not just as an incredibly concise and well-edited *Amidah* – which it *is* – but **as a** *way* **to** *pray* **to** *avoid* **religious repetition.** (Mt 6:7) And apparently to get something off His chest that must've been really bothering Him about the boys, saying:

When you pray, do *not keep* on *babbling* like *pagans*, for *they* think they will be heard because of their many words. Do *not* be like *them*, for your *Father knows* what you need *before* you ask Him. [Right? *You* don't need to inform *Him*] *This*, then, is *how* you should pray" — Matthew 6:7-9 NIV

And this, then, is *why* Jesus needed to offer a template for talking to God. Templates like this were known in Jesus' day as **Index Prayers** – a practical way to convert scattered thoughts into thoughtful words. The irony is that many today pray the Lord's antidote *mechanically*.

Now, the Lord's prayer *should* be prayed *as* is – because it must be *memorized*. Because each easily memorized segment *sparks* and *inspires* thoughts and desires we might otherwise easily overlook and forget to say, and fail to discuss with our Father. So for it to *serve* it's *intended purpose* and *function* we must **pray** and **personalize** and **pause to listen** to the Lord.

His prayer is deceptively simple – but in no way shallow; and if we use it as He taught it our prayers will deepen every day. Because our Father's prayer is an effortless index on which to hang our deepest needs, and darkest secrets, along with our tears and fears and hopes and praise.

[And so] "In this manner, therefore, pray: 'Our Father in heaven'" – Matthew 6:9 NKJ



Jesus opens by emphasizing the closeness God *himself* desires. Our Father wants to be approached first and foremost on an intimate basis; the way a small child – whose father just happened to be a *king* – would jump onto his lap to say, "I love you!" And **this prayer isn't just for us, it's also for our Father.** Know why? Well, you may seek *Him*, but:











He seeks godly offspring. – Malachi 2:15 NKJ

And He wants to be greeted with childlike affection. And being Father's Day, I thought we could use a little refresher on the first line of the Lord's prayer. So you pray: "Our Father" and then personalize it with - not childish, but childlike affection for our Father. And then pause to hear what He has to say to you. Are you already on such intimate terms? If not, don't worry if it feels weird at first. Jesus' own disciples didn't think of our Father on such intimate terms; and it hindered their prayers and their relationship. Hence the Lord's antidote. And thanketh to King James and his "thee"s and "thou"s, many believers grow up thinkething our Father prefers formality. But who wants their kids to say, "We beseech thee to bestow thy allowance." That's weird. And look how Jesus places personal ownership in there? This is the sweet "our" of prayer! Because He's all ours! in the same way a child possesses the heart of a loving parent, and vice-versa, His heart belongs to us, just as ours belongs to Him. Especially if you're a prodigal come home! That father literally runs to that reunion. Of course, everyone is His child by creation. But as you know, there's more to being a dad than creating a kid. After we're created, we gotta be connected. And there's just the *one* connection.

To all who received [the true Light], to those who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God — children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision ... but born [again] of God. - John 1:12-13 NIV

So why does Jesus includes His address in His template? Well, "in heaven" isn't really about His location (God's house in the sky) as much as it's about His sovereign, transcendent authority.

[For] Thus says the Lord: "Heaven is My throne" – Isaiah 66:1 NKJ

So first and foremost is relationship, but right on its heels is reverence. Because we must strike a balance between our Father's intimacy and authority. It's often said that Jesus remade God's Old Testament image into an affectionate Father. Not true. Jesus didn't come to save God's image ... He is God's image! (Col 1:15) And as such, He came to reveal, not to remake. Because the point the prophet Isaiah was making 750 years before, was all but lost.

Look down from heaven and see from Your lofty throne ... [For] You, O Lord, are our Father, our Redeemer from of old is Your name. – Isaiah 63:15-16 NIV

Well there's "our Father" in "heaven" (as a "throne" of authority) whose hallowed "name" is "our Redeemer", whose foes exist by His will, within His plan, for His children's eternal best. John and Jesus were best *friends*; but when *John* got a *glimpse* of His *heavenly* Redeemer-Father, he says:




His eyes were like blazing fire ... His face was like the sun shining in all its brilliance. ... I fell at His feet as though dead. Then He placed His right hand on me and said: "Do not be afraid." – Revelation 1:14-17 NIV

How do you suppose you'll react when you see Him face to face?

Well, maybe we should start preparing for that moment by *praying:* "in heaven"; and then *personalizing* it, like: "I *gladly bow* and *joyfully submit* cuz, I know that I know, You're the only One in *full* control." And then *pausing* to consider what His throne of *authority* is *saying* to *you*.









I love C.S. Lewis' balance with Aslan in The Magician's Nephew, saying "They were terribly afraid it would turn and look at them, yet in some [strange] way they wished it would." Well, our *Father* may be *fierce*, but He's more than a *force*. Cuz He's our *fearless* and *fearsome Friend*.



It used to be a compliment to be called "God fearing". Now we tend to over-focus on our Father's "softer side". And when we do, we begin to see Him as a harmless old softy on sin (and our relationship and prayer life suffer). So don't confuse "Father" God with "Uncle" God.

And that goes both ways. If we don't balance His intimacy and authority we'll see Him as either an indulgent uncle or a harsh, intolerant, force of nature. So, which aspect of His nature do you tend to overemphasize? Because, too much softness produces liberalistic self-condoning, and we fail, to our own detriment, to realize how alarmingly powerfully He opposes our sin. On the flip side, too much fierceness produces legalistic self-condemning, and we fail to find the joy of our salvation, or to feel the very real forgiveness our very loving Father so freely offers. Truth is:



God is love. [That's not how He's *defined;* it's how *love* is! And therefore] Whoever *lives* in *love* lives in *God,* [the *Father*] and [Father] *God* in *them.* – 1 John 4:16 NIV



And, love is something more fierce than just kindness. Kindness wants to numb pain or alleviate suffering. Which is why a kind vet will shoot a horse. But love is deeper. More complicated. And often involves suffering. Because love longs to help face the pain and walk through it. Kindness cares only that pain is removed, not that healing is attained, or maturity achieved. Kindness is what you show to the neighbor's kid as you tolerate 'em. Love is what you show your own. And it often upsets your own kids: "Why can't you treat me like you do the neighbor kids?" "Because you are mine."



People mostly want a soft, toothless, doofy ol' lion. A Santa-sugar-daddy who tosses out forgiveness like parade candy, dispensing grace without demanding growth. But here's the rub: that's a desire for less love, not more. So which tendency do you tend to lean toward? Our Father doesn't want us terrified. Just motivated. Confident but not complacent. Cuz our Father is fearsome, awesome, and then some!









But a whole lot of believers have a huge barrier when it comes to connecting with our Heavenly Father. Know why? Earthly fathers! Because we project their faults and flaws onto our flawless Father. Which is why it's important to honor the godliness of our down-here dads. But even good dads distort our perception of God. Was your father ever unreasonable or unreliable? Of course he was! It's just a matter of extent. So give him a break. It's Father's Day. And he's only human. And we need to realize and verbalize that our Redeemer isn't like our father ... He is our Father! He's not even a reflection of all that's good about fatherhood is still a dim reflection of our Father! (1 Cor 13:12) But, in fatherhood's most inspiring and gracious moments, it is the essence of our Heavenly Father. And that's what we honor on Father's Day.

Our God is the gold standard of good dads. Because, He's the one and only genuine definition. But what's the one and only genuine definition of our Father? That'd be the #1 Son, who said:

If you really knew Me, you would know My Father as well. – John 14:7 NIV

For unto *us* a Child is born, [though He has no beginning; and] unto us a *Son* is given ... And [guess what] *His* name will be called ... Everlasting Father – Isaiah 9:6 NKJ

Have we not all one Father? Has not one God created us? - Malachi 2:10 NKJ

For by [the Son] all things were created - Colossians 1:16 NKJ

[For, as He said] "I and My Father are one." – John 10:30 NKJ

Yet for us [who believe that] there is one God, [who is] the Father, of whom are all things ... and one Lord Jesus Christ, through whom are all things – 1 Corinthians 8:6 NKJ

[Cuz, like He said] "He who has seen Me has seen the Father" – John 14:9 NKJ

So, how *often* do you think *you* unconsciously project your down-here dad's bad traits onto our Father? I suppose the answer for all of us is: too often. So, *this then*, is *how* we should *pray*:

"Our Father [the all-loving Father of all, on the throne] in heaven, [because of the defects our down-here dads all had] hallowed be Your name" – Matthew 6:9 NIV

If we think of God as a *religion*, a distant *force*, or a *drill sergeant*, we can't *truly pray*, "Our *Father*". And if we think of Him as an *ol' softy* and *disregard* His *absolute authority*, we can't *truly add*: "In *heaven*". Cuz we're here to *hallow* a *perfectly balanced Parent*: our *Maker-Redeemer-Dad*.

Is He not your Father, your Creator, who made you and formed you? – Deut 32:6 NIV

[So] Whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it. – Mark 10:15 NAB

[So] Acknowledge and take to heart this day that the Lord is God in heaven above and on the earth below. [And] There is no other [truly heavenly Father]. – Deuteronomy 4:39 NIV

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
