Hallowed Name

Balancing Honor and Fear June 25, 2023

Today we're feeling guilty about prayer – I mean learning!



Did you see the Lord's Prayer in the news last week? Want to feel smart? Answer this *Jeopardy* question: Matthew 6:9 says, "Our Father which art in heaven, [this] be Thy name." Seems it stumped the panel!











Last Sunday we took a look at "our Father in heaven". Which is the first half of the first line of the Lord's Prayer. But being that every Sunday is our Father's day, I thought I'd follow it up by finishing the sentence. So, let's get right to feeling guilty, shall we? Did you hallow our Father's name this week? If not, you're not alone. We know that prayer is right and true and the thing to do; but, prayer can feel like an intrusion in our busy, chaotic lives. Most believers feel convicted about it, but even with good intentions, rarely make enough time for it ... because of those WMDs: weapons of mass distraction. Facebook. Twitter. YouTube. And family, friends, and work, and Netflix. So we mostly settle for feeling guilty. And if you want to feel really guilty, just recall that Paul wrote:

Rejoice *always*, <u>pray without *ceasing*</u>, in *everything* give thanks; for *this* is the will of *God* in Christ Jesus for *you*. – 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 NKJ

Well that's short, sweet, and seemingly impossible. Pray without ceasing? I don't think it means without taking a breath or eating or sleeping. Just that we need to make prayer a part of the fabric of our daily life. So how do you greet our Father when you get up? Overly anxious? Overly formal? Overly mechanical? Or overly complacent, overly impatient, or overly demanding? Cuz it's usually overly something — that's just how we do down here. Because we're practicing righteousness while being made holy (sanctified); (1 Jn 2:29, 3:7; Heb 10:14) remember that ol' tugboat and tanker?

Well this is where the Lord's ... antidote comes in handy. Because the purpose of the Lord's Prayer is to prompt a profoundly relational daily conversation with a divine Dad. Which is why it must be personalized in order to work. It's like a heavenly Hallmark card to which we add our heartfelt expressions. And so, when we wake, we should affectionately greet our Father, and submit to Him as Lord (lit. Master), and then take some time — in fact, until our head hits the pillow again — to hallow His name. He asks a probing question through the prophet Malachi, saying:

"A son honors his father, and a servant his master. [i.e. Lord] If then I am a Father, where is My honor? And if I am a Master, where is My fear?" – Malachi 1:6 ESV



That's the stuff that shows up throughout the day in the way we use our words and actions. But, before we go any further, let's allow our Father to clear up a couple of things. Like, why does He refer to our relationship as a Master (i.e. Lord) and servant? Any comment, Father? Well ...

You are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus ... [There is neither] slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one [son] in [the body of] Christ Jesus. [And] If you belong to Christ, then [with Christ] you are Abraham's seed, and heirs ... [So] What I am saying is that as long as the heir is a child, he is no different from a slave, although he owns the whole estate. [lit. as in the NKJ and ASV: "though he is master/lord of all", because] He is subject to guardians and trustees until the time set by his father. — Galatians 3:26-4:2 NIV

Oh. Okay. But why do you want us to fear You? We often hear that the fear of the Lord is an awesome reverence. And we can certainly use it that way. But when we're using His Word, shouldn't we let Him define what He means when He uses the term? Proverbs says:

[If you] search for [wisdom] as for hidden treasures; then you will *understand* the fear of the Lord, and find the knowledge of God. – Proverbs 2:4-5 NKJ

And sure enough, six chapters later, wisdom *appears*, compares herself to *treasures*, and says:



[Receive] [the] knowledge [of God] ... the fear of the Lord is to hate evil; — Proverbs 8:10, 13 NKJ





So that's how the wisdom of our Father defines it! Think we can do that? Hate evil? Because, to hallow Him is to honor Him as His children and to hate evil in all its forms. But now, hallowing His name is not the same as hallowing Him. To hallow is to set apart and cherish as holy. Which is why we refer to places like Pearl Harbor as hallowed ground. Or if you had a house fire, we might say you tried to save your most hallowed or cherished keepsakes. And so, of course we cherish and revere Him as our Father enthroned in heaven, but hallowing His name specifically means to treat His name as holy. So why is that so important? Because:

[All] the earth shall see that you are called by the name of the Lord – Deut 28:10 ESV

Hallowing isn't *only* about *expressing respect* for our *Father* and our *hatred* of *evil*; **we must** *also* **live a** *daily lifestyle* that *honors* and *exalts* and *glorifies* our *family name*. And so, we certainly:

Sing out the *honor* of His *name* – Psalm 66:2 NKJ

[And] exalt His name together! – Psalm 34:3 ESV

[Cuz] We are called by Your name – Jeremiah 14:9 NKJ

[But we must also] Make known His deeds ... [and] glory in His holy name – Psalm 105:1-3 NKJ

[So] Shine before others, that they may ... glorify your Father in heaven. – Matthew 5:16 NIV

Our family name is especially hallowed when we display His work in us to the world. And the opposite is sadly true as well. Like, when Moses pitched a public fit of disobedience, the Lord said:



"Because you did not <u>believe Me</u>, [i.e. <u>trust Me</u>] to <u>hallow Me</u> in the <u>eyes of the [people]</u> ... you shall not bring [them] into the land which I have given them." – Numbers 20:12 NKJ



Same goes for *me* and *you* with the people He's placed along *our* journey to the *Promised Land*. And if you haven't *noticed*, **He takes** *distrust* and *disbelief* very *personal!* Because, *disobedience* from *distrust* un-hallows **His name**. And His name *will* be hallowed, *with* or *without* us.

[He warned His chosen people] "You shall not profane My holy name, but [even if you do] I will be hallowed among the children of Israel." – Leviticus 22:32 NKJ

Even if He has to hallow it himself! Cuz that's how He draws the world to Himself. Like He did when He scattered and then gathered the rebellious children of Israel from among the nations.

"When they *came* to the *nations* ... they profaned *My* holy name—when [the nations] said of *them*, 'These are the people *of* the *Lord*, and *yet* they have gone out of *His* land.' But I had *concern* for *My* holy name ... And I will *sanctify* [lit. *hallow*] My *great* name ... and the *nations* shall *know* that I am the *Lord* ... when I am *hallowed* in *you* before *their* eyes ... and bring you [back] into your *own* land. – Ezekiel 36:20-24 NKJ

So don't *dishonor* **His** *name* **in the** *eyes* **of those** *around* **you!** Or you'll *profane* the family *name*, and you might just be setting yourself up to be used as a *bad* example.

Love must be sincere. [So] Hate what is evil; [and] cling to what is good. – Romans 12:9 NIV



And PRAY: hallowed be Your name ... today! And then PERSONALIZE how you feel about being called by His name; and how you intend to honor it ... today ... by clearly, lovingly, hating evil and putting Him on full display. And then PAUSE to hear in what way you might need to trust and obey throughout this day, to be made more holy than yesterday. Like, when that waitress brings you a sandwich with mayonnaise, after you specifically told her to hold the mayonnaise: hallowed be the family name? Yes? That's good! You're growing. Or when that driver takes his turn at the four-way stop, when it's clearly your turn: hallowed be Thy name? Not so much? That's okay ... if you're growing. He's given us His good name, and left us in charge of hallowing it in the eyes of our world, whether at home, or at work, or at the grocery store (after you gave her the coupon, and then noticed, on the way to the car, that she charged you the full price ... twice), or at a very poorly umpired ball game. We should "pray without ceasing", in these situations: "Help me to hallow our name." We're always hearing Jesus' and God's name profaned by the world. Let 'em. This is about when and where we profane our Father's name in any way in word or deed around 'em.

I mostly couldn't care less when it comes to the world's G-ds and f-bombs. Cuz you can't clean a fish before you catch it. But I cringe when I hear believers casually say "Oh my god!" Not because it offends me, but because using His name flippantly un-hallows Him. Isaiah is one of the greatest prophets who ever lived. And yet, when he saw our Father enthroned in heaven, he cried out:



"Woe to me! ... I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the King ... – Isaiah 6:5 NIV





In the presence of perfect *purity* and *holiness*, *he's* instantly intensely aware of the contamination of his culture, and his *own need*, as one who *knows truth*, for God's *mouthwash*. When I was young, my friend's mom's living room had white wall-to-wall carpet, white couches, and white drapes. We didn't *dare* go in *there*. That *room* was *terrifying*. Cuz we *hated* the thought of *staining* it. As we *consistently*, *privately*, begin our day *focused* on His *absolute holiness* and *separateness* from *sin*, we become *intensely aware* of what in *us un-hallows Him*. And that's *good* and *right* and *healthy*; because, if it's *un-hallowing* Him, it's *poisoning* us.

Trying to find *fulfillment* down *here* without *hallowing* our Father up *there* is a *deadly, self-centered* pursuit of *oblivious self-glorification*, that leaves a wake of *disappointment* and *regret*, because there's *no perfect*, *holy love* or *faithfulness* down *here* other than what *comes* from up *there*.

[And so] Not to us, O Lord, not to us but to Your name be the glory, because of Your love and faithfulness. – Psalm 115:1 NIV

[Jesus said] "I have come in My Father's name" – John 5:43 NKJ

[And] "I have made Your name known to them" – John 17:26 NAS

[Cuz] You, O Lord, are our Father, our Redeemer ... is Your name. – Isaiah 63:15-16 NIV

[So] Ascribe to the Lord the glory due His name – Psalm 29:2 ESV

And give thanks at the remembrance of His holy name. - Psalm 30:4 NKJ

And there's a *surprisingly striking connection* between *glorifying-by-hallowing* the NAME of God and *glorifying-by-hallowing* the WORD of God, because ...

His NAME is the WORD of God. - Revelation 19:13 NIV

It's time to begin to see *His Word* as hallowed ground where we approach our hallowed Father to listen to trust to obey. Because "hallowed be Your name" means "trusted be Your Word". So, how often do you hallow *Him* when you start your day? Cuz something happens when we set Him apart as the first and foremost, highest and holiest aspect of our day. We wake up to the sobering reality that we're not the center of our universe; He is! And with that, we're far more likely to hallow His name, throughout the day, in all the eyes of those around us, without ceasing.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
