Pray by Ear How to Stop Praying Like Pagans

Today we're opening our ears and learning to listen!

Because, the big question is: Do you pray with faith?



The last time we spoke, we were talking about, what Scripture calls, Jesus' "wings" – and the sneaky woman in the crushing crowd who touched 'em in faith, and was immediately healed. Because, unlike the *persistence* of the *pushy-people*, who were acting on *impulse* based on *desire*, *she* was acting on *hope* based on *faith* in God's *Word* (regarding the *promise* in *Malachi* (4:2) of the *healing* that was *waiting* in the *wings*).

So Jesus *stops* the *presses* and makes her *explain* her *actions*. Because, **if** we're not *trusting* Him when we're *coming* to Him, we're *acting* more like *pagans* than *children*. And we *can't trust* what we *don't know*. And so, taking a *tip* from His *wings*, we need to *know* His *Word*, so we can *reach out* in *faith* as we *hope* in His *promises* without *pushing* our *own agenda*. Which also means we must *trust* His *answers* as we come to understand them. And it's not all that complicated, cuz He's only got the three: "Yes", "No", and "Yes, but not yet". Now that *last* one is the *tricky* one; cuz we can mostly *only* see it in *hindsight*. And in the meanwhile we mostly *mistake* it for "No".

So, we should treat every apparent "No" as though it's a "Yes, but not yet" until we know that we know it's a "No". This is quite often the case when praying for healing. And then, when you know, don't view a "No" as though He didn't answer. Trust that He did; and that He did what He did for the eternal best of everyone involved till the end of time. Your prayer doesn't fail when He says "No"; in fact, you absolutely know His answer!

And so, we must be *persistent* without being *pushy*. Which means we must not pray harder, but truer and sincerer. And true sincerity requires regular practice. One of the first things a good *coach* will do, is to help his *players unlearn* what they're doing *wrong*. Which is exactly what Jesus does with His prayers, when He begins training His twelve to pray ... His way. Saying:

When *you* pray, go into your room, *close* the *door* and *pray* to your Father ... and *when* you pray, <u>do not keep on *babbling* like *pagans*</u>, for *they* think they will be *heard* because of *their* many *words*. Do not be like *them*, for *your* Father *knows* what you need *before* you *ask* Him. – Matthew 6:6-8 NIV

So what should we do instead? Maybe listen for a change. Pagans, in Jesus' day, recited formulaic prayers in order to *appease* and *control* and *manipulate* their otherwise indifferent gods. They were more like magic spells than prayers.



It wasn't about faith or trust in their love. It was often the opposite: trying to please an uncaring god. And it was strictly business; "I offer (this) so that you'll do (that)." It wasn't a partnership, it was a business transaction – a quid pro quo. So why does Coach Jesus begin His prayer-training by warning His twelve young apprentices to "not keep on babbling like pagans"?

Because they *kept on babbling* like *pagans!* And the first thing He wanted 'em to do was to *please* not keep on *doing* that. Same goes for *us.* Even *more so.* I mean, this is His *chosen twelve* we're talking about! So we better *all* the more *beware* that **the** *best* **of believers can** *carelessly practice* **what** *Jesus* **calls** *pagan-like prayer* – mostly in a *well-meaning* but *misguided* attempt to *make* their prayers more *powerful* rather than more *sincere.* But *sadly,* **it** *only* **makes** 'em more *offensive* – by unwittingly attempting to *appease* rather than to *please* our loving Father.

Obvious observation: Jesus' *boys* were *Jews;* which means they were raised reciting the ten minute Amidah, three times a day, five days a week, 780 times a year. And besides the Amidah, there were prayers for waking, washing, eating, and finishing; morning, evening, and bedtime blessings; weekend prayers, holiday prayers, and special prayers for everything from seeing a rainbow to receiving bad news. It isn't that the *boys* didn't know how to *talk* to God, they didn't know how to *stop!* Which is why Coach Jesus helps them *unlearn* their *prayer-babbling*.

Imagine the *temptation* to *rattle* through these *pre-recorded* prayers as quickly as *babble-able*, **focusing on the** *act rather than the attitude*, in repetitive *pagan-esque* fashion. So Coach Jesus begins with the *warning* found in *Ecclesiastes* (5:2) to "let your words be few".

But, more than that, the real question at the core is: **Do you** *pray* **with** *faith?* Because ...

Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God. – Romans 10:17 NKJ

A fool has no delight in understanding, but in expressing his own heart. - Proverbs 18:2 NKJ

[So] A fool's mouth is his undoing, and his lips are a snare to his soul. – Proverbs 18:7 NIV


[So] Let the wise listen and add to their learning, and ... get guidance – Proverbs 1:5 NIV

[If you sincerely desire answers to prayer] When you go [to God] ... draw near to hear rather than to give the sacrifice of fools, for they [who 'delight in expressing their own heart'] do not know that they do evil. [Cuz they don't listen] Do not be rash with your mouth, [nobody likes rash-mouth] and [since your mouth speaks what's in your heart] let not your heart utter anything hastily before God. For God is [our Father] in heaven, and you [are His child] on earth; therefore let your words be few. [And open your ears to hear] ... [For] <u>a fool's voice</u> is known by his <u>many words</u>. – Ecclesiastes 5:1-3 NKJ

[And thus] "When you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray ... for [babbling pagans] think they will be heard because of their many words." – Matthew 6:6-8 NIV


I wonder what "door" Jesus is referring to, being He knew David's prayer request in Psalm 141, to:

Give ear to my voice when I call to You! Let my prayer be counted as incense [a pleasing] aroma] before You ... Set a guard, O Lord, over my mouth; keep watch over the door of my lips! Do not let my heart incline to any evil, to busy myself – Psalm 141:1-4 ESV



Ever watch a movie with a nonstop talker? "She's the killer. Wait. He's the killer. Wait. It was suicide." Ever pray like that? "Lord, give me this. Wait. Give me that. Wait. Give me this and that." In both cases: "Shh. You wait. And just watch. Cuz you're missing out by butting in." We think of prayer as mostly talking, but it should be mostly listening. "Amen" shouldn't mean "We're done!" but, "Okay, I'm all ears." Because:

child, [cuz] I thought as a child; but when I became a man, I put away childish things. For now we see in a mirror, dimly ... [Because, for] Now [as a child of God] <u>| know in part</u> – 1 Corinthians 13:9-12 NKJ

And *like* children, we *forget* to *close* the *door* and open our *ears* and let our Father get a Word in edgewise. We love to listen to our children ... to a point. But when they won't stop talking, and won't listen, we shush 'em to help 'em to hear what they need to hear. So Jesus begins their prayer-training by saying, "Shh. Try to talk less." It almost sounds like He's saying to pray less. But He's not. He's saying to speak less when you pray. Turns out, there's another – very neglected – side of prayer. Trouble is, we're not sure how to listen to our Father. Because it doesn't mean sitting in silence straining to hear our own imagination. It means actually listening to Him speak.

So how do we pray by ear rather than by mouth? Well, the answer is found in the Bible. No surprise. The surprise is: it is the Bible. Turns out, reading God's Word is praying by ear!

We're told in Hebrews (12:6-7) that the Proverbs are *Father-God's* instructions to us. So:

^{1:8} Hear, My child, your [Heavenly] Father's instruction ... ^{1:23} I will pour out My thoughts to you; I will make My words known to you. ... ^{1:33} Those who listen to Me will be secure ... ^{2:1} My child, if you accept My words ... ^{2:10} wisdom will come into your heart ... ^{4:1} Listen, children, to a Father's instruction ... do not forsake My teaching. ... 4:4 Let your heart hold fast My words ... ^{4:20} My child, be attentive to My words; incline your ear to My sayings. ... ^{5:1} My child, be attentive to My wisdom; incline your ear to My understanding ... ^{5:7} My child, listen to Me, and do not depart from the words of My mouth. ^{7:1} My child, keep My words ... ^{7:2} keep My teachings ... ^{7:3} write them on the tablet of your heart. ... ^{7:24} My children, listen to Me, and be attentive to the words of My mouth. ... ^{8:10} Take My instruction ... $^{8:32}$ My children, listen to Me ... $^{8:34}$ Happy is the one who listens to Me ... $^{10:14}$ The wise lay up knowledge, but the babbling of a fool brings ruin ... ^{10:19} When words are many, transgression is not lacking, but the prudent are restrained in speech. ... ^{13:3} Those who guard their mouths preserve their lives; those who open wide their lips come to ruin. ... ^{13:13} Those who despise the Word bring destruction on themselves ... ^{15:5} A fool despises a Parent's instruction ... ^{17:27} [But] One who spares words is knowledgeable ... ^{17:28} Even fools who keep silent are considered wise; when they close [the door of] their lips, they are deemed intelligent. ... ^{19:27} Cease straying, My child, from the words of knowledge ... ^{22:17} Incline your ear and hear My words, and apply your mind to My teaching ... ^{23:15} My child, if your heart is wise, My heart too will be glad. ... ^{23:19} Hear, My child, and be wise ... ^{23:22} Listen to your [Heavenly] Father who begot you ... ^{28:9} [Because] When one will *not* listen ... even [their] *prayers* are an *abomination*. – Proverbs NRS

Jesus' disciples saw prayer as mostly **repeating the words they thought our** *Father* **wanted to hear.** But, when we realize that praying is mostly about listening, and that God will speak if and when we seek, we'll begin to *rewire* our *desire* to *read* and *reflect on* His Word. Because, if we foolishly view reading Scripture as *studying* rather than *listening*, we'll justify not reading based on the *false fact* that it's not *relational*. And we'll end up offering a fool's one-sided prayer.

How *ironic* that the Amidah begins: "Lord, open my *lips* that my *mouth* may declare ..." And to Jesus' *flabbergasted* apprentices' utter *disbelief*, He edits the entire 10-minute Amidah to about 30 *seconds*! Because it isn't *God* who needs to *hear us* – He *knows* our *needs before* our *prayers* – which is why *listening prayer* should take up the *lion's* share of our *prayer time*.



So when do you allow Him to speak, whether by reading or reflecting? Cuz that requires finding a way to get away to close the door and pray by ear. Unlike the religious rulers who always found a way to make things too difficult, Jesus had a way of making things too simple. So we try to complicate it. But, trust Him, when it comes to prayer, our Father prefers a few heartfelt words with a lot of listening. Especially while fishing. He was always fond of that.

So close your door, open His book, and listen to our Father, who said:

"Receive into your heart all My words ... and hear with your ears." - Ezekiel 3:10 NKJ

So close the door and pray! Because He can't open your ears till you open His Word.

What do you call a *friend* who *won't listen?* Who *calls* a friend who *won't* listen?! They won't *listen*. Therefore, if *we're* gonna *answer* the *call*, we better be the *listening type*.

So what do you say we shut up and pray?

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
