
Present Value

Working on Wanting Jesus

Today we're developing our desire for the greatest gift ever given! Cuz as much as we want to want what God wants to give, the truth is, it's not usually at the top of our list. And to flip that script, we're gonna have to honestly answer some hard questions like: What do you want more than Jesus? Cuz aint none of us living like we want Jesus most! So, what's really at the top of your list?







And as we mature, we also all learn that some of the presents we need most are the ones that hurt most! At a certain point we start quietly craving things like cologne, gym-memberships, and Rogaine. But, when someone actually buys them for us, our excitement is offset by the fact everyone's acknowledging, we're bald, fat, and smelly!



And these principles are important to remember once we receive God's Son as our greatest gift, cuz once He's in our life, Jesus can feel undesirable and unpleasant. And it's important for us to admit that honestly as we work to change it earnestly! We have to take an inward look at how we really feel about Jesus, so we can work on wanting Him more. Cuz truth is, most of us feel like world-renown philosopher and author, Aldous Huxley, who said this about his thoughts on God:

"I had motives for not wanting the world to have a meaning; consequently assumed that it had none, and was able, without any difficulty to find satisfying reasons for this assumption..."

An agnostic, Huxley at least had the courage to admit his self-serving reason to hope against God; a real God means the things we want could carry consequences we don't want! And above all, Huxley desired freedom to do whatever he wanted without worrying whether it was right or wrong. So, because of that bias, he unsurprisingly found reasons to believe what he wanted. And that's the way it always goes when the truth goes against what we want – like Jesus said to the Pharisees:

Because I tell the truth, you do not believe Me! – John 8:45 NIV

And we're all guilty of this when the TRUTH He brings, brings the truth about us into light. Cuz

This is the verdict: Light has come into the world, but <u>people loved darkness instead of light</u> because their deeds were evil. Everyone who does evil hates the light, and will not come into the light <u>for fear that their deeds will be exposed.</u> – John 3:19-20 NIV

This is indeed a dark world full of every *awful* thing we've *all* ever done – and we're too *helpless* to help *ourselves* out of the mess *we* made. So even though it's *embarrassing*, at a certain point we *must* admit the present we *need* most may not be the one we *want* most, cuz it might *hurt* most!



And only after we start to see *that's* how Jesus works will we'll *ask for, accept,* and *appreciate* His presence in *our* lives. But, to have *that* heart, it's *essential* that we explore how we *see three* of His *key qualities*. Because Jesus is Challenging, Jesus is Surprising, and Jesus is Fulfilling!



So first, let's look at how Jesus is challenging. Well, He's the light that came into the darkness! And that means His mere presence shakes things up and challenges the status quo! So consequently, if we want comfort more than construction, we'll see Him as a threat! Remember, Jesus was very upfront about His purpose in coming here:



Do not suppose that I have come to bring *peace* to the earth. <u>I did not come to bring peace</u>, but a sword. – Matthew 10:34 NIV



Contrary to popular opinion, Jesus' presence doesn't mean the war is over, it means the battle has begun. And Christmas day was D-day in the battle between light and dark! It marked the moment when those opposed to truth couldn't run and hide, but had to decide whether to fight the light or surrender and submit. Like Herod, when the Magi said:



"Where is the One who has been born King of the Jews? We saw His star when it rose and have come to worship Him." [So,] When King Herod heard this he was disturbed ... [And fearing a challenge to his throne] he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under [just because he felt threatened!] – Matthew 2:2-3, 16 NIV

And every time we read this story, we all say, "Oh that Herod! What a monster!" But when we stop and think about it; are we really so different? Well, apart from the actual genocide that is...

[Because] The mind governed by the flesh is hostile to God. – Romans 8:7 NIV

Do you realize that's our default human setting; hating God?! Cuz our flesh inherited control of our life the moment we were born and doesn't want to surrender! So we all see threats as enemies! Ever felt threatened by a new cool kid at school, a new hot shot at work, or a new stud in your small group who makes your spouse laugh out loud? Me too! And what do you want to do? Go get 'em!

Any threat to the power or plans we have must be stopped at all cost! And if you were a king who found out another king might edge you out – well you'd get mad, push back, and go get them!


So, every one of us has a little Herod in our heart. Cuz every one of us starts off comfortably in control as the king of our lives and we're not real keen on some stranger coming in to call the shots! So, we gotta expect, when our heart starts surrendering, we're gonna feel some hostility!

And if you're here this morning and you're still struggling with believing, I can understand why surrender is such a big barrier to your faith – but I hope you realize the struggle to surrender is what makes it impossible to be impartial. That is, we can't trust ourselves to make a rational decision about God, because we have a conflict of interests. If God exists, we lose control, and we know we don't want that. So in the same way a judge can't hear a case against a company he owns, we can't judge the case for a King whose very existence threatens our throne!

Just like Aldous Huxley, if we are invested in anything from this world, we're already unconsciously hoping against God – cuz He's the biggest threat to the life we know!



[And that's why] Anyone who chooses to be a friend of the world becomes an enemy of God. – James 4:4 NIV





Problem is, we really like the way familiar feels, but our new King isn't a fan of 'business as usual'. Because whoever had control wasn't Him and therefore, wasn't leading us to life! So, as He takes the wheel and pulls a full 180, we start to see why Jesus is surprising!

It's not just that He challenges and changes things, He does things that we can't possibly anticipate or understand! Like when He warned Habakkuk how He would fix Israel by helping their enemies:

I am going to do something in your days that you would not believe, even if you were told. – Habakkuk 1:5 NIV

Everything He offers is *new* and *improved*, so if we've *only* worked with *old* and *broken*, we have to *expect* the *unexpected*. Because **life feels foreign if all we've known is death.** *Perfect* feels *impossible* if all we've known is *flawed*. And *true love* feels *false* if all we've known are *frauds*.

When we've become accustomed to a *sub-par* standard, we're shocked and *shaken* by a *superior* experience – but **if we want safety** *more* **than solutions, we'll find Him frightening!** Unknown things are *scary* and scary things are *unwanted*. So we're not naturally *thrilled* when He says:

The *greatest* among you will be your *servant*. [Cuz that's *not* the *way* we expect Kings to come. And we were severely shaken when He said] – Matthew 23:11 NIV

I did *not* come to bring *peace*, but a *sword*. [Cuz that's *not* the *stuff* we'd hoped He'd bring. And it's downright terrifying to hear Him say] – Matthew 10:34 NIV

Whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for Me will save it. [Cuz that's not the path we'd ever expect to lead to life!] – Luke 9:24 NIV

But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, so that no one may boast before Him. - 1 Corinthians 1:27-29 NIV

Our #1 problem has always been believing we're #1, so we've always expected our Savior would have a strength and wisdom similar to ours. But we're not just wrong, we're completely backward! Down here, our idea of strength is weakness, our idea of wealth is poverty, and our idea of life is death! And if we're all upside-down and backward, of course our Savior's gonna be surprising, too!


So, knowing that – if we still want our aim to stay the same, by living a predictable pattern, we're declaring we want counterfeit comfort and safety more than Jesus. But here's where Jesus is most surprising - real comfort and safety only come from Him! And the more we come to know Him and His heart, the more we see He isn't threatening and frightening cuz He's challenging and surprising; Jesus is challenging and surprising because Jesus is fulfilling.



He's a pair of warm socks, a set of tools, and a BBQ that we're surprised to love so much. And – He's the cologne, gym-membership, and Rogaine that are challenging to admit we need! So




Don't be deceived, my dear brothers and sisters. Every good and perfect gift is from above, – James 1:16-17 NIV
