David's Size

Today we're ending the excuses that enslave us to stop us from serving heroically!








So, who told David to fight Goliath? It's not in the story. He's just taking cheese to his brothers' battalion. (1 Sam 17:18) When Samuel anointed him, he said nothing about giants. (16:13) His brother tells him to get lost. (17:28) And King Saul tries to talk him out of it. (17:33) So how'd he know God was calling him? Cuz (don't hate the answer), it needed getting done, and no one else was doing it. You see, whenever you see something you know God wants done, and nobody's doing it, and you know you could ... guess what! Ring-ring! Guess who! God may call several times a day to ask you to serve in some way. And when He does, you can just let it keep ringing, which'll cause anxiety; or hang up real fast, and quickly put it out of mind; or put Him on hold ... indefinitely; or spring into service like the loyal slave you are. "I'm a slave?"

Do you not know ... you are that one's slaves whom you obey, whether [slaves] of sin leading to death, or [slaves] of obedience leading to righteousness? But ... though you were slaves of sin, yet you obeyed from the heart ... and having been set free from [slavery to] sin, you became slaves of righteousness. – Romans 6:16-18 NKJ

And slaves are on call 24/7. Whenever someone says, "You know what the church should do?" I love to say: With the vision comes the anointing. That shuts 'em up! But if not you, who? Think of how many legitimate excuses li'l David could've made. "I came to deliver cheese, not Israel. I'm not a soldier. I'm not trained. Saul's armor's way too big. God didn't command it. Let Saul, he's over 7' tall, and (as Psalm 119:141 says), 'I'm small and despised,' and that hulk is literally a giant! And Saul himself said, 'You are a youth, [David was 15, give or take] and he a man of war from his youth." So what's your excuse? Cuz we only have two as you'll see. And every lie-de-jour that we tell ourselves or others, however original, is sin that we're serving rather than defeating.







My family moved into what is now the youth house when I was two. That's me with the ball. And a couple years later, I decided it was more expedient to just do #2 in the yard. Which did not go over too well. Threats and warnings were made. But sure enough, I dooed it again. So pops marched me to my pile of sin and asked if I did it. I said no. He asked, who did. I said, a dog. He asked, what kind of dog? And realizing our backyard had a tall fence, I said, "A circus dog!" I can't tell you how proud I was of coming up with a dog that's known for jumping over things! But Pops saw right through, and I got my just due, not only for the #2, but even more so for the excuse — which was an outright lie — which, turns out, was a far worse crime. And every dishonest excuse, no matter how cunningly and craftily we deceive ourselves, is more or less like that circus dog, in our Father's eyes.



It might make sense to you; but Jesus sees right through. And we don't get to dictate when or where we'll be obedient. Cuz whatever you're doing, it's never only about delivering cheeses! It's always also about displaying Jesus. So, when that call comes, we can either #1 ... obey, or #2. So what'll you do? Defy? Delay? Or obey? What's your preferred excuse of the two? Do you think Jesus came to simply remove our burdens? No. That's only the half of it. He came to trade our burden of sin for His burden of truth. Cuz truth is a burden. Just ask Isaiah, (13:1) Nahum, (1:1) Habakkuk, (1:1) or Malachi, who were each told to convey:

The burden of the Word of the Lord – Malachi 1:1 NKJ

Because, He yokes, or collars, us as slaves to truth; and saddles us with the burden of proof.

For the Lord of hosts [writes Zechariah, 500 years before Jesus] will visit His flock ... and will make [His sheep] [also] as His royal horse in the battle. – Zechariah 10:3 NKJ

[So] When you go to battle against those who hate you and see more horses and warwagons and soldiers than you have, do not be afraid of them. For the Lord your God, who brought you from the land of Egypt, is with you. – Deuteronomy 20:1 NLV

[Now I] remind you ... that Jesus ... saved a people out of the land of Egypt – Jude 1:5 LSB

[And] Today you are going into battle against those who hate you. [So] Do not let your hearts become weak. ... For the Lord your God is the One who goes with you. He will fight for you against those who hate you. And He will save you. — Deuteronomy 20:3-4 NLV

I will instruct you [writes David] and teach you in the way you should go ... [so] Do not be like the horse or the mule, which have no understanding but must be controlled by bit and bridle or they will not come to you. – Psalm 32:8-9 NIV

"Come to Me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke [of ownership] upon you [around your neck] and learn from Me, [as your Master] for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls." — Matthew 11:28-29 NIV

Bind [mercy and truth] around your neck ... [and] Trust in the Lord with all your heart ... In all your ways acknowledge Him, and [then] He shall direct your paths. ... [for] [wisdom and discretion] will be life to your soul and grace to your neck. — Proverbs 3:3-22 NKJ

"For My yoke is pleasant, and My burden is light." – Matthew 11:30 ISV



Not that it isn't heavy, but that He'll equip and empower and inspire and strengthen us to bear it; if and when we submit and learn from Him.

For our *light affliction*, which is but for a *moment*, is *working for* us a *far* more *exceeding* and *eternal weight* of *glory* – 2 Corinthians 4:17 NKJ

Now, many Bible translations tell us that:

David was the **youngest**. – 1 Samuel 17:14 NIV

But that word is also translated as: smallest. So which is it? Youngest or smallest? A scholarly dive into word usage and immediate context will conclude "youngest". But a childlike trust that God's Word is perfect, while playing seek-and-find with the story pieces, will reveal that ... well, I'll let you decide: "Jesse had eight sons" (1 Sam 17:12) (feel free to use your fingers); "Jesse's first son was Eliab ... and his seventh was David." (1 Chr 2:13-15) Therefore: "David was the [youngest or smallest]." Circle one! Cuz once you see it, his entire story changes! Because, as Samuel well knew:

[No] man who has a *defect* ... <u>or a *dwarf*</u> [i.e. *abnormally small*] ... shall *come near* to *offer* the *offerings* ... [the *altar's* too *tall*, so] he shall *not* come *near*. – Leviticus 21:17-21 NKJ

[But] The Lord said to Samuel ... "I am sending you to Jesse ... Take a heifer ... and say, 'I have come to sacrifice to the Lord.' [And] Invite Jesse to the sacrifice" [So] ... When he arrived ... [he said] "I have come to sacrifice to the Lord ... come to the sacrifice with me." Then he consecrated Jesse and [only 7 of] his [8] sons and invited them to the sacrifice. When they arrived, [without the smallest] Samuel saw Eliab [the most favored firstborn] and ... [the Lord said] "Do NOT consider his appearance [which can mean favored status or good looks] or his height ... Jesse had seven of his [8 favored] sons pass [by] ... So [Samuel] asked Jesse, "Are these all the sons you have?" "There is still the [smallest]" [who was forbidden to come] ... So he sent and had him brought in. [And] He was ruddy, with a fine appearance and handsome features. — 1 Samuel 16:1-13 NIV

Solve this: Samuel does NOT consider appearance. But, appearance can mean "favored status" or "handsome features". And Samuel DOES consider "handsome features". So it's not that. Which means Samuel was warned to ignore favored status and height. So, why would Jesse, a godly man, include his youngest but exclude his smallest at the sacrifice, even after the others were rejected? He was honoring God's Word. How? I call Psalm 119 to the stand again, to testify that:



"I am **small** and **despised**." – Psalm 119:141 NKJ

He's the runt! Not by age, but by despised size! Average height in David's day was 5' 5". So how small is small enough, to be disdained enough, to be excluded? Peter Dinklage is 4' 5". Is that small enough to make all the pieces make sense? Like why God had to command Samuel to not consider favored status and height? Many conclude the restriction applied to those under 4'! Picture that! But, unlike every other taller, more favored brother:

[God] testified ... "I have found [dinky] David [the small and despised, 7th] son of Jesse a man after My own heart; [cuz] he will do everything I want him to do." – Acts 13:22 NIV

Like taking on giants without making excuses! And, do you see how it says that God's heart is like a servant's heart! Remember when the angel said to Mary, that:

[Jesus] will be great and ... God will give Him the throne of David – Luke 1:32 NAB

[Why? Because] "The greatest amon g you will be your servant." – Matthew 23:11 NIV

And it is this *godly servant-nature* that the Lord *saw* when He *said*:

I have found <u>David My servant</u> – Psalm 89:20 NIV

I have sworn to David My servant – Psalm 89:3 NIV

By My servant David I will rescue My people Israel – 2 Samuel 3:18 NIV

[And] I will place over them one shepherd, My servant David – Ezekiel 34:23-24 NIV

And then God gave their shared Son, Jesus, David's throne and authority and calling. And:

He himself bore [the burden of] our sins ... so that, free from sin, we might live for righteousness. ... [For] the Shepherd and Guardian of your souls. – 1 Peter 2:24-25 NAB

For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve – Mark 10:45 NIV

[So] Your attitude [your heart] should be the same as [Jesus] ... who, being in very nature God ... [took on] the very nature of a servant – Philippians 2:5-7 NIV

So we should be using our light afflictions to allow Jesus to strengthen us to handle the full weight of glory! Because, excuses don't solve problems, they waste 'em! Whatcha wanna bet that being the runt is the very means by which God prepared David to take on Goliath? "Everyone's a giant to me." Just as Paul proclaims: His strength is perfected in our weakness! (2 Cor 12:9) So whatever you do, don't lean on Jesus as an excuse to stay weak. He's our Savior and Teacher and Trainer.

[So] Cast your burden on the Lord – Psalm 55:22 NKJ

[Cuz, get this] You are the burden ... for the burden is everyone's own word ... [when] you pervert the words of the living God [by action or inaction] – Jeremiah 23:33-36 NRS

For my iniquities are ... a heavy burden they weigh too much for me. - Psalm 38:4 NAS

[But] He gives strength to the weary and ... power [to] the weak. – Isaiah 40:29 NIV

[So] Do not fear, for I am with you ... I will strengthen you and help you – Isaiah 41:10 NIV

Not by removing our troubles, but by using them to strengthen and empower us. That's why:

I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me. – Philippians 4:12-13 NKJ

[It's] To this you were called, [ring-ring] because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in His steps. -1 Peter 2:21 NIV

[Cuz, get this] Whoever claims to live in Him must walk as Jesus did. – 1 John 2:6 NIV

Which means, we accuse ourselves when we excuse ourselves. Because we're not called to an easy life, but a powerful life – where the small and despised run toward their giants! So don't seek the enslavement of comfort. True rest comes from trust; and trust comes from acting on truth. No excuse! We can't take up His yoke without giving up ours. Cuz it's only offered as a trade.

[And] Blessed are those who do His commandments ... But outside are [all those circus] dogs ... and whoever loves and practices a lie. – Revelation 22:14-15 NKJ

Because, truly I say to you, as one server to another, it's never only about delivering cheese.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
