UnEasy Street

The Curse of Success
February 11, 2024

Today we're recognizing the slippery spiritual slope of earthly success. Cuz as sweet as it can seem down here, success also has a way of holding us back from up there. So we're gonna work on sorting things out by answering this: What do you want out of life?







For [as Scripture promises us,] our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all.



But the problem is, while we're down here, it's hard to want what we can't see but, it's easy to see what we shouldn't want! And because God knows it, this Scripture goes on to tell us how to change our desire.



So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal. [But, that change is a whole lot easier said than done.] – 2 Corinthians 4:17-18 NIV

I mean, they're eyes... and they kinda prefer visible things. So how do we take them off all the incredibly attractive and easy-to-see things that the earth offers and turn them toward something better, but invisible?

Well, we got two tactics that can shift our focus from those damaging desires to more productive pursuits: one, we can glorify our goals like we did last week, by emphasizing the hard-to-see appeal hidden in earthly struggles. Or two, we can also shift our focus when we vilify our vices. So today, I'd like to vilify our vices by minimizing the easy-to-see appeal flaunted by earthly success. Because we know what we want to want – but it's hard to look past all this earthly stuff we wish we didn't want! Good thing Paul offers some encouraging advice and explanation:

Walk by the *Spirit*, and you will *not* gratify the desires of the flesh. For the *flesh* desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the flesh. They are in conflict with each other, so that you are not to do whatever you *want*. ... [So what do we *do* with those unwanted earthly desires?] Those who belong to Christ Jesus have *crucified* the flesh *with* its passions and desires. Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking *and* envying each other. – Galatians 5:16-17, 24-26 NIV

So there you go — we gotta kill the appeal of earthly desire by erasing any opportunity for envy. And that means our worldly success shouldn't be bragged about or wished for, it should be downplayed until the desire for it is dead. Cuz we can take the teeth out of temptation when we stop romanticizing what the world offers and start recognizing its inadequacy.

So, let's crucify some earthly desires by erasing some envy! It's surprisingly easy! Just take a closer look at any person with the worldly success you think you want. And here's what you'll find: lottery winners have a greater chance of going bankrupt in the next 3-5 years than you do.¹ Famous musicians are two to seven times more likely to commit suicide.² And professional athletes are 75% more likely to suffer a mental health crisis than you;³ which is extra crazy, cuz athletes start more mentally stable than the average but grow unstable the more elite they are!⁴













But however you slice it, the bottom line is this: easy street ain't all it's cracked up to be! So we should feel pity, not envy, for all those poor saps who've had the misfortune of achieving all their earthly dreams! Like all these kids who are about to play the Superbowl today, only to find out, it's not enough! And if you still don't believe me, just listen to the desperation in this 27-year-old's voice as he talks about it.

Whether it's Superbowl *rings*, a supermodel *spouse*, or a super-sized *bank account*, all materially-measured *achievements* ultimately promise the same *sad* thing: *they end*. Because **you can't** *buy* **happiness**, **you can only** *rent* **it**! And if *that's* your strategy, you'll find yourself *stuck* in a lifelong *loop* of trying to *expand* and *extend* your *material* value:

Whoever <u>loves money never has enough</u>; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with their income. This too is meaningless. [Cuz as Ecclesiastes loves to point out, it's all just "chasing the wind"] – Ecclesiastes 5:10 NIV

And if you want to see a striking example of what it looks like when our earthly answers close in on their unavoidable end, check out how poor Tom Brady handled that final season which he had been fearing would rob him of meaning since he was 27. Now obviously, I'm going for dramatic effect, but still, he ain't happy! And this is an unfortunate theme for many who experience great worldly success. Like Rainn Wilson says, "When I was in The Office, I spent several years really mostly unhappy because it wasn't enough. I was making hundreds of thousands. I wanted millions. I was a TV star, but I wanted to be a movie star. It was never enough." Or as Troy Aikman put it "Here I was at the top of professional football, and I found myself thinking, 'Now what?""

You believe it yet?! Earthly goods aren't part of the good life! Cuz real life isn't about what we get in this world, it's about what we get out of this world. It's about learning what has real value.

[So] Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; [cuz it can keep you grounded down here, but real] life does not consist in an abundance of possessions. – Luke 12:15 NIV

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future [Cuz His plan is use this life's insufficiency to teach us to reach out for the satisfaction of a real life!] – Jeremiah 29:11 NIV



Because real life is perpetually vibrant, thriving, and satisfying – while everything in this life – always dulls, dies, and never satisfies. And because of that, our material successes are fleeting. And because of that, our lives are filled with new struggles. When we win a Superbowl and ultimately feel the insufficiency of success, we're forced to struggle with the new question, "Why is this not enough?!" And voila! We're right back to wrestling!

"If success means everything, and everything isn't enough. What do I do?" Well, we got two options, get mad at everything for letting you down, or get a bigger everything that won't.









Cuz that approach just leads us to a *new* experience of the *same* mistake.

If we're let down by wealth, don't think it's power. If we're let down by power, don't think it's fame. And if we're let down by a Superbowl victory, don't think it's women - I'm looking at you David! Cuz, we've been praising the strength from his struggle, but it was his success that messed everything up. Remember, David beat Goliath in a battle bigger than the Superbowl when the whole nation was watching. And after that, he spent years succeeding at everything – while his legend grew and he became King! So he was pretty much the biggest deal ever and yet, it was right then, when he had his "Now what?" moment and:

One evening David got up from his bed and walked around on the roof of the palace. From the roof he saw a woman bathing ... and David sent someone to find out about her. The man said, "She is Bathsheba, ... the wife of Uriah the Hittite." [But still]: Then David sent messengers to get her. She came to him, and he slept with her. – 2 Samuel 11:2-4 NIV

David, David, David... you had everything! What are you doing?! How could this happen?

[Well,] This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says [to David about this]: 'I anointed you king over Israel, and I delivered you from the hand of Saul. I gave your master's house to you, and your master's wives into your arms. I gave you all Israel and Judah. And if all this had been too little, I would have given you even more. Why did you despise the word of the LORD by doing what is evil in His eyes?. - 2 Samuel 12:7-9 NIV



Well what have we learned? Why would David throw everything away when he had such incredible success? It wasn't enough! And don't let God's question mislead you – He knows exactly why we do evil in His eyes – the *question* is for *our* benefit! Cuz that question is what pushes us through God's brilliantly designed training circuit:

Struggle builds strength, strength builds success, and then success builds struggle. And on it goes.

Until hopefully, at some point, it accomplishes its goal: we give up on earthly answers! Cuz when success falls short, the easy-to-see answers in this world start to lose their appeal. And our eyes start to recognize that only an infinite and loving God could provide a big enough "everything" to satisfy our desires. And once we realize only God can offer everything the earth can't, it becomes easy to also see, the only thing earth can offer that God can't, is sin. And all the sudden, it also gets easier to shift our focus from what we see down here to what's unseen up there.

[The way it took David's Bathsheba debacle, for him to finally kill the desires of his flesh and look to the Lord:] Against You [Lord], You only, have I sinned and done what is evil in Your sight; so You are right in Your verdict and justified when You judge. — Psalms 51:4 NIV


[And when our eyes wander upwards, we learn:] Whom have I in heaven but You? And earth has nothing I desire besides You. – Psalms 73:25 NIV



Deep down, everyone in this room has something that we think, "If I just had that, I'd be a success." And whatever that is, you're full of it. But if that something isn't God, you're setting yourself up for that lifelong loop of disappointment. And you'll only ever find crisis, not comfort.



However, if you finally have *your fill* of *underwhelming* answers and shift your focus to a relationship with an overwhelming *God*, well, it completely changes *both* experiences of *struggle* and *success*; just listen to the *satisfaction* in this 24-year-old's voice as *he* talks about it.



Now I can't tell you how hard it is for me to root for a 49er, but when someone has the only gameplan that guarantees a victory, well, you gotta respect their game. And his is: Win or lose, glorify God. That's the game-changer. Cuz chasing things down here keeps us in the painful cycle of struggle and success but when you aim it all at the Lord, it adds a new dimension, up. And the nature of your cycle of struggle and success changes, as it turns into a spiral staircase. Cuz each step doesn't just spin you in circles but actually takes you closer to God.

So what do you want out of this world? Well, to get out of this world! Life down here, doesn't have what we want. But if we use all of its struggle, strength, and success to glorify God, and we're outta here! Cuz without God, easy street is a dead end! but with God, it leads to the beginning of real life! And if this life is merely a means to an end, God's gotta be the goal.

Therefore ... let us throw off [the insufficient earthly] everything that hinders and the sin [only earth offers] that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes [upward,] on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before Him He endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. – Hebrews 12:1-2 NIV

Look, this place *ain't it.* And the more we realize what a *letdown* it *is,* the *easier* it becomes to *shift* our focus from the *false* promises of material *success* to the *proven* promises of *Jesus Christ*. Cuz without Jesus, this place is a vicious cycle but with Jesus, it's a stairway to heaven!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
