Offering Loans to the Lord
September 1, 2024

Today we're talking about honoring God with our giving. Because, money's tight. Right?

But, as kids of the King, we can't afford to be tight-fisted with the Lord!



So answer this: What does the Lord receive from your hand?

Money is just weird. Right? Over the years, we've hired church members to do odd jobs. And many times they ask us to put whatever we were going to pay, on their giving record instead. But legally we can't. So we tell 'em they're welcome to put their check in the offering. But when they get that check, they rarely give it back. Cuz once it's in our hands, it's hard to let it go. Because, money is weird ... right?! It's been two years since we've talked about tithing. But, if you've been a believer a while, you likely know that when a pastor says we're talking on tithing, there's a good chance that either 1) it'll be a veiled effort to fund a program or project (which is not my intention); or 2) he'll haul out Malachi, chapter three, and beat you over the

















head with it! Which is my intention – so let's turn to Malachi 3:8.



'How do we rob You?' In tithes and offerings. - Malachi 3:8 NIV

That's 'how' we rob God – like how a gun is how a mugger robs a person; and how a crowbar is how a burglar robs a house. Tithes and offerings is how a believer robs God – but then, what is it exactly that we rob God of? Cuz He said He doesn't need any things from us.

"I have no need of a *bull* from your stall or of *goats* from your pens ... If I were hungry I would not tell *you*, for the world is *Mine*, and *all* that is in it." – Psalm 50:9-12 NIV

You see, their giving was used in large part to help widows and orphans and the destitute.















So, they were robbing God of giving and caring, as well as one of His greatest loves: blessing those doing the giving. Therefore, when we rob our Father, we cheat ourselves. But then, how exactly were these cheats stealing by giving? By giving God their less-than-best. In our Route 66 video on Malachi, a sacrificial animal salesman is trying to pawn off a dead lamb, with a detachable ear, until Malachi says it's for a party. The embarrassed seller says, "My apologies ... I thought it was just for the Lord."

"If I am a Father, [says the Lord] where is the honor due Me? ... When you bring blind animals for sacrifice ... [or] crippled or diseased animals, is that not wrong? Try offering them to your governor! [Who was? Governor Nehemiah, of the OT book of Nehemiah] Would he be pleased with you? [Think about it] ... [When you] offer them as sacrifices, [having sacrificed nothing to offer 'em] should I accept them from your hands? [What would that say about Me? Thus] ... Cursed is the cheat" – Malachi 1:6-14 NIV

So, whatever you do, don't give your Lord your leftovers. Especially since He only asks for one slice, for our own benefit. Because, our giving conquers our greed, and increases our Christlikeness, and gives us a share in His work. But, if we only ever offer our leftover time or money or energy, we'll be withholders rather than shareholders. And, as you already believe: He deserves our deepest love and highest loyalty. Now, we're not buying His blessing, right? We're offering tokens of trust by tangibly loving others in His name. Which is why faithful followers offer firstfruits rather than last leftovers. Know why Governor Nehemiah is mentioned, saying: "Would he be pleased with you?" Cuz he wouldn't! Cuz he wrote the book on firstfruits! Explicitly declaring:

"We obligate ourselves to bring the firstfruits of our ground and the firstfruits of all fruit of every tree, year by year, to the house of the Lord; also ... the firstborn of our herds and of our flocks ... the first of our dough, and our contributions" – Nehemiah 10:35-37 ESV

I've practiced this since Sunday school, when we had colorful envelopes in which to collect our coins during the week. And when I was older, I deposited my paycheck (remember paychecks?) and immediately wrote a tithe check, and tucked it in my wallet. Cuz I knew, if I gave from what was left over, it'd be pretty lame. Now I use automatic giving. Cuz it's great for offering stability. Get it? It secures my consistency, which fortifies my faithfulness — especially when I'm tempted to give my leftover "dough". And now we'll be able to scan a QR code during offering. You see, they not only blocked God's blessing, they blamed Him for it — in spite of His warnings through Moses, saying:

"Do not offer to the Lord the blind, the injured or the maimed, or anything with warts or festering or running sores." – Leviticus 22:22 NIV

Is it *me*, or is it *embarrassing* this *had* to be a *rule*? And, just *curious*: **do** *you* **give** *more* **to** *your Governor*? State *sales tax* is 6.5%; and gas tax is 49¢/gal! Malachi's *mob* showed more *respect* to *Nehemiah*, God's *manager* and *minor prophet*, than *God* the *Messiah*, Nehemiah was *foretelling*. Like them, we're *called* **to** *grow* **in ever-greater** *giving*. Because, **our Father** *can't bless stingy kids*. Because we're *blessed* by *blessing*, and *cursed* by *coveting*. Which is *why* of *Malachi* warns us:

"If you do not <u>set your heart to honor My name</u>," says the Lord Almighty, "I will <u>send</u> a <u>curse</u> upon you, <u>[by the consequences intended to drive</u> us to our <u>eternal best]</u> and I will <u>[have no choice, but]</u> <u>curse</u> your <u>blessings</u>. Yes, I have <u>already</u> cursed them, <u>[not because of money, but]</u> because <u>you have not set your heart to honor Me</u>." – Malachi 2:2 NIV

Have you? Set your heart? He practically begs His children to test Him in this. Saying to:

"Bring the whole tithe [one-tenth] into the storehouse ... [and] <u>Test Me in this</u> [See!?] ... and see if I will not throw open the <u>floodgates</u> of <u>heaven</u> and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." – Malachi 3:10 NIV


So test Him and see, cuz we're blessed to the degree we invest ourselves. Cuz He doesn't "pour out so much blessing" ON YOU; but FROM YOU! Because "you will not have room enough for it."

"Because the kingdom of God is within you." – Luke 17:21 NIV

"Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water." – John 7:38 NRS

Get it? You are the floodgate He's dying to throw open to pour out His blessing! Paul says:







You will be <u>made rich</u> in <u>every way</u> SO THAT you can be <u>generous</u> on <u>every occasion</u> ... [your giving] is not <u>only supplying the needs</u> of God's people but is also <u>overflowing</u> in <u>many expressions</u> of <u>thanks</u> to God. ... [Because] Men will <u>praise</u> God for the <u>obedience</u> that <u>accompanies</u> your <u>confession</u> of the <u>Gospel</u> of Christ, AND for your <u>generosity</u> in <u>sharing</u> – 2 Corinthians 9:11-13 NIV

[But] Now listen, you [stingy] rich people, weep and wail because ... Your wealth has rotted, and moths have eaten your clothes. Your gold and silver are corroded. [And] Their corrosion will testify against you ... [cuz] You have hoarded wealth in the last days. ... You have lived on earth in luxury and self-indulgence. [And rather than fattening a calf to share with others] You have fattened yourselves in the day of slaughter. – James 5:1-5 NIV

Well that's encouraging. Here's how The Message paraphrases that ending.

You've *looted* the earth and *lived* it *up*. But all you'll have to *show* for it is a *fatter* than usual *corpse*. – James 5:5 TMNT

Well, don't sugarcoat it, James. Question is: does that sound encouraging or discouraging? Be honest with yourself. James is speaking for the poor and neglected and exploited. He's like a speaker at a MADD rally, crying out: "You drunk drivers will pay! And your victims will be vindicated!" It's inspiring stuff ... unless you're the drunk driver, or in James' case, the hoarder. So, did you hear it as inspiring or condemning? As Americans, we likely all heard it the same way. They had three ways to hoard their wealth: grain, garments, and gold. And James nails all three: "Your wealth [of food] has rotted," and "moths have eaten your clothes," and "Your gold and silver are corroded". And he then adds that: "Their corrosion will testify against you". How? Why? Well, where does our food usually rot? In the back of the fridge. And when do moths eat our clothes? When we store 'em, cuz we don't wear 'em. These are all signs of stuff being stored rather than shared in the name of the Lord.



Remember that brand new 1957 Belvedere that they sealed in a time capsule, and then dug up 50 years later, to everyone's utter disappointment and dismay? Well, don't bury your Belvedere! Whatever your Belvedere may be. Because:



The <u>generous soul</u> will be made rich, [in every way] and he who waters [from his heart] will also be watered [from within] ... [and] [in this way] the righteous will flourish like foliage. – Proverbs 11:25, 28 NKJ

Remember when the Lord *spoke* to *Job* out of the *whirlwind*, and said:

"Who has given to Me that I should repay him?" – Job 41:11 NAS

What's the answer? And don't say: Nobody! Cuz God asks us the question, cuz He's given us the answer. But don't feel too bad, Job was also a bit befuddled by it. But wise ol' Solomon knew that:

Whoever is generous to the poor lends to the Lord, and He will repay – Proverbs 19:17 ESV

Well, okay. So the next time you're reading Romans, and you hear Paul say:

Oh, the *depth* of the *riches* of the *wisdom* and *knowledge* of God! ... Who has ever *given* to *God*, that God should *repay* him? – Romans 11:33-35 NIV

Raise your hand and say, "Oh! I know! I know!" "Whoever is *generous* to the *poor*". And just before *Job* was *questioned* by *God*, the Lord's *spokesman*, *Elihu*, asked him *this*:

"If you are *righteous*, what do you *give* [God]? Or what does He receive from your hand? [Here's a hint] ... Your righteousness [affects] a Son of Man." [How?] – Job 35:7-8 NKJ

Well, after Jesus tells the story of the one-talent servant who buries his "Belvedere", He says:

"When the <u>Son of Man</u> comes ... He will separate the people [into shareholders who affected Him, from withholders who defected from Him] ... as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats ... [and] will say to [the sheep] 'Come, you who are blessed ... For [it turns out] I was hungry and [didn't tell you; but] you gave Me something to eat [rather than letting it rot] ... I [actually] needed clothes and you clothed Me, [rather than feeding the moths; and] I was sick and you looked after Me [despite the cost] ... [for] whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of Mine, you did for Me." [The Son of Man; and I was very much affected by it] — Matthew 25:31-40 NIV

So then, "what does [the Lord] receive from your hand?" Food, clothing, and care. Unless He doesn't. So, offer the Lord the loan that affects the Son. Stop hoarding and start storing!.

"Give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." – Luke 18:22 NIV

Let's not be withholders who only ever offer our Father lame leftovers. Instead, let's set our hearts to honor Jesus; and let's set aside a set amount, and then grow in our giving. Malachi had a faithful few who set their hearts to honor the Father and coming Savior. And we now know Him by name! So I'm ready to test Him and offer Him a little loan, like that faithful few. Are you?

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
