
## Chop-Chop Snip-Snip



The Sharp Reality of God's Love June 18, 2025

## Today we're talking about balancing sternness and kindness – both ours and God's!











Both ignorance and arrogance are self-deceiving. Only wisdom and humility can secure our connection and assure our calling. But both of those are something we must all grow into. Just as Jesus, the divine Vine, spread the light of God's love, and the fruit of God's Spirit, to a dark and dying world, we who embrace and bond with Him become His budding, blossoming, and blooming branches, to continue to reach out with the fruit of His Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control) to appeal to those within our reach, who respond to our unique flavor, to come and taste the goodness of God. Jesus said:

"I am the True Vine, and My Father is the Gardener. [Why? Well, He made the Garden of Eden our home. And we were cut off. So Jesus prayed in a garden, was betrayed in a garden, and buried in a garden, and arose in a garden. Know what kind? A rose garden. And when He rose, Mary mistook Him for ... the gardener! But His Father is the Gardener, and] He cuts off every [false] branch in Me that bears no fruit, [Chop-chop!] while every [faithful] branch that does bear fruit He prunes [Snip-snip!] so that it will be even more fruitful. [But that's it? Chop-chop or snip-snip? What about coddle-coddle or pamper-pamper? Not the way of our Father] ... [So] Remain in Me, as I also [in the same way] remain in you. [How's that?] ... If you remain in Me and I [in the same way] in you, you will bear much fruit [because: Snip-snip!] ... [But] If you do not remain in Me, you are like a branch that is thrown away [Chop-chop!] and ... thrown into the fire and burned. [But] If you remain in Me and [here's how we remain in Him the way He remains in us] My words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, [regarding bearing fruit] and it will be done for you. [Because] This is to My Father's [the Gardner's] glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be My disciples." – John 15:1-8 NIV

And thus, we *remain* in His *Word* so that His *Word remains* in *us.* And therefore, we *bud* and *blossom* and *grow* in *wisdom*, and *mature* in *reverence* and *confidence*, as His *ambassadors*.



Since, then, we *know* what it is to *fear* the *Lord*, we try to *persuade* others. ... For Christ's *love compels* us, because we are *convinced* that *One died* for *all* ... [and] *All* this is from *God*, who <u>reconciled us</u> ... and gave us the <u>ministry of reconciliation</u>: that God was <u>reconciling the</u> <u>world</u> ... And He has <u>committed</u> to us the <u>message of reconciliation</u> ... [as] Christ's <u>ambassadors</u> – 2 Corinthians 5:11-20 NIV

[You see] Israel was a spreading vine; [but] he brought forth <u>fruit for himself</u>. ... [Because] Their heart [like every heart] is deceitful, and now they must bear their guilt. ... Then they will say, "We have no king because we did not revere the Lord." – Hosea 10:1-3 NIV

"The fear of Me is not in you," says the Lord God of hosts. ... "Yet I planted you as a choice vine, from the purest stock. How then did you turn degenerate and become a wild vine?" – Jeremiah 2:19-21 NRS

[And Paul warns us to avoid their error, saying] Do not be arrogant, but [rather] be afraid. For if God did not spare the natural branches, [Chop-chop!] He will not spare you either. [So "be afraid." "But, I thought perfect love drives out fear." (1 Jn 4:18) It does. But driving is a process that requires wisdom. And the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. (Prv 1:7)] Consider therefore the kindness and sternness of God: sternness to those who fell, [Chop-chop!] but kindness to you, provided that you continue in His [Snip-snip!] kindness. Otherwise, [it'll be chop-chop, and] you also will be cut off. And if they do not persist in unbelief, they will be grafted in ... After all, if you [gentiles] were cut out of an olive tree that is wild by nature, and contrary to nature were grafted into a cultivated olive tree, how much more readily will these, the natural branches, be grafted into their own olive tree! — Romans 11:20-24 NIV







Except, commentaries seem to enjoy pointing out, that olive farmers don't graft wild branches into cultivated trees. They graft cultivated branches onto wild trees. Because each branch, wild or cultivated, continues to produce its own fruit. Most give Paul a pass, by noting that he's teaching theology, not horticulture, and therefore has poetic license for his ignorance. Though they word it more like respected theologian C.H. Dodd, who said: "Paul had the limitations of the town-bred man ... and he had not the curiosity to inquire what went on in the olive-yards which fringed every road he walked." With all due respect, the Bible isn't a haphazard book. Far from it. It's the trustworthy Word of the Author of salvation. And Paul wasn't an ignorant city boy. Far from it. Which is why he lets us know that he knows that what he's describing is "contrary to nature". And Paul and our Creator get the last laugh; because, an ancient grafting technique was rediscovered by Nobel Prize winner Sir William Ramsay, who found that: When a cultivated olive tree ceases to produce any fruit, it can be reinvigorated by grafting a wild shoot into it. Well, shoot!

Now, discipline always seems painful [snip-snip] ... but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who [remain and] have been trained by it. — Hebrews 12:11 NRS

[Because] The Root of the righteous bears fruit. – Proverbs 12:12 ESV

[Because] "I [Jesus] am the Root and the Offspring of David" – Revelation 22:16 NKJ


[Therefore] The fruit of righteousness will be peace; [and] the effect of righteousness will be quietness and confidence [rather than hotheadedness and arrogance] — Isaiah 32:17 NIV

And [so Paul says] it is my prayer that your love may abound ... for the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ – Philippians 1:9-11 ESV

[Because] The fruit of the righteous is a tree of life – Proverbs 11:30 NIV









No sacrifice for sins is *left*, but *only* a *fearful* expectation of *judgment* and of *raging fire* that will *consume* the *enemies* of God. – Hebrews 10:26-27 NIV

I cringe a bit when someone calls God the Big Guy or the Man Upstairs. But on the flip side, if we focus only on General God's sternness, we'll see Him as impossible to please; because, all sternness produces legalistic self-condemning. And we'll fail to find the joy of our salvation, or to feel the forgiveness He so freely offers, and to take to heart that:

There is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus – Romans 8:1 NIV



God is love. But, love is something more stern than kindness. Because kindness simply desires to numb or alleviate pain. Which is why a kind vet might help a suffering horse by shooting it. But we require something a bit more complex. Which is why a kind but stern God helps us to face pain to find healing. Which means removing suffering is secondary to overcoming it. Still, we want a God who dispenses mercy without demanding change. And yet, that's a desire for less love, not more. Which is why our Gardner won't let us off the pruning hook, if our desire for comfort is causing us to rot on the vine. So, do you have a proper respect for the sharp reality of God's love? Because, a balanced awareness of His kindness and sternness produces righteousness. And peacemaking fruit is so essential, that Jesus gives it priority over worship. Saying:

"If you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother [or sister] has something against you, [rightly or wrongly] leave your [symbolic] gift there in front of the altar. [And] First go and [offer your true gift, and living sacrifice, and] be reconciled" – Matthew 5:23-24 NIV

Cuz it's kind of our #1 Job. And it's fairly painfully ironic for Christ's Ambassadors of Reconciliation to others, to try to worship Him while willfully ignoring what needs some reconciling pruning in their own life. So, here are some quick recommendations for reconciliation, for when you realize that someone has something against you. First, take the initiative ASAP. Make the first move and make contact fast, whether it's your fault or not. Because, delay only deepens resentment.







Put it on a to-do list with buying milk or weeding, and train yourself to see it as just another simple task. The hardest part is just getting that ball rolling; so text or call or email, and just say, "Can we talk? I need to apologize." Do that and the battle's half won. And it's sure to get their attention. But, don't go in to convince or condemn. Go in to – now listen close – to listen close and to please Jesus. All it takes is two little ears instead of one big mouth. And it turns out, we can sympathize with those with whom we disagree. And that's when a minor miracle occurs. Because, when they know that you care how they feel, they'll likely care how you feel. And that grace feels amazing! But whatever your offense, right or wrong, intentional, unintentional, or imagined, own up to your own part with shockingly humble honesty. Anything less just isn't as fun. And if you're gonna do it, do it right!

This is called *removing* the *log* from our *own eye*. And *Christ* is *clear* that *this* comes *first* in His *book*. And *along* those *lines*, let's *keep* in *mind*: we *can't* make *peace* by *making excuses*. God has *called* us as *peacemakers*, not *excuse-makers*. We have a *great memory* when it *comes* to those who've *offended us*. But, we *tend* to *forget* about the *offenses* that *we've caused*. So, **don't** *mistake* a *poor memory* for a *clear conscience!* Ask the *Lord* to *help* you *recall* all *those* you *need* to *reconcile*. And *allow* a *healthy reverence* for our *Gardner's sternness* to *help* you *overcome* your *resistance* to a *little awkwardness* or *self-consciousness*. And finally, *if* and *when* it's *your turn* to *share*, *express* your *hurt* with *tender honesty*. Because, *when* we *attack* they *will defend*. So, *attack* the *problem*, *not* the *person*. And *offer* the *Lord* your *relational nuclear arsenal*, like: *sarcasm* and *insults* and *comparisons* and *belittling*. Because, we *won't* be *persuasive* when we're *abrasive*. And, *more* than *that*, we want to *continue* in His *kindness*. Did you *happen* to *notice*, that although we're to "consider" *both* His "kindness and *sternness*", we "continue" only "in His kindness".



But, a little reminder of His sternness now and then will send us running to re-embrace the security of His kindness. Because, the terrifying becomes awe-inspiring when seen from a safe position. Have you seen China's glass skywalk, built 4,000 feet up, on the side of a cliff? I showed it about five years ago. But I guess they don't sue in China, because they added glass cracking sound and visual effects! Fear is a good starting point. Like causing a kid to be too scared to touch a hot stove. But we don't continue in fear. We continue to grow in His loving kindness. We'll all feel the sharp reality of God's firm love – given that every branch gets the blade. The only question is: chop-chop or snip-snip? Since some get the scalpel and some get the axe. But our divine Vine is patient and precise and personally invested in the growth of every single sprout. So don't fear God's pruning, fear avoiding it. After all, the snip-snip of conviction and correction reminds us that we're connected. So let's get to work, and go out on a limb, and bear some ambassador fruit just for Him. It might simply begin with an awkward text, and end with a surrendered, "I'm sorry."

Just keep in mind, when you're standing on, what Scripture calls, the sea of glass before His throne, (Rev 4:6) you'll want to hear Him say, "Well done, wild branch!" and "Nice fruit!" So, consider His sternness, and continue in His kindness, and let the pruning commence!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
