## Subatomic Faith

Simply Job-Shadowing Jesus

## Today we're counting the cost to follow the One who paid the price!













Have you seen the latest reader board on the potato shed in Burlington? It says: "Life is like a game of chess. I don't know how to play chess." What I love about Noah's "Atomic Faith" series is that, 1) he gave us Bit-O-Honeys, and 2) it's helping us to see that life can be lived like a game of checkers, with simple, small moves that lead to big spiritual wins. We must become as little children. (Mt 18:3) And, little kids can't rely on willpower to change their behavior.

So we must also count the cost, (Lk 14:28) and take solid, sacred, baby-steps to mold our identity. And then, patiently wait for spiritual muscles to gradually grow as our new nature takes its course. Thing is, we write off — even laugh off — the potential spiritual power of sustainable subatomic steps. For months, I rebelled against a post-it I wrote that says: start using pullup bar. Cuz I don't want to. Cuz it's a commitment. But I want to want to. Cuz I want to be fit. So, three weeks ago, I counted the cost; and now, every morning, I faithfully go to the garage and say hi to my pullup bar. Cuz we underestimate the cost of consistency. But now, I'm slowly becoming a guy who goes to a pullup bar. I don't want to brag, but I've even hung on it a few times, and pulled myself up once or twice — cuz I wanted to. That's subatomic success!

So, the question today is: **Do you want to be just like Jesus?** Cuz I didn't! But I wanted to want to. So I took it smaller. And first I had to figure out what that even means. I mean, you gonna move to Israel; learn Aramaic; speak in parables; and wear a tallit and tzitzit? "I don't know what a tallit and tzitzit is." Then you can't be just like Jesus! So the load got a whole lot lighter when I realized: I want to be what Jesus would be if He was me. Cuz that's what He wants. Cuz He's not into clones or carbon copies. But He's big into unity – but not the stamped-out, cookiecutter kind you find in cults and boy bands. Cuz that's uniformity. And the Lord is all about the unity of distinctly different disciples forming one body. Cuz that's harmony. Which requires living relationships rather than dead religious works, wherein each part can accomplish our uniquely created-purpose. And suddenly I could clearly see what He meant when He said:



"Can a blind man lead a blind man? Will they not both fall into a pit? A student is not above his teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like his teacher. [In what way? Not identical. Just not blind! So] "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye [before you're fully trained] and pay no attention to the plank [that remains] in your own eye? ... first [let the teacher fully train you to] take the plank out of your eye, and then you will see clearly [like your teacher] to [humbly, lovingly, gently help] remove the speck from your brother's eye." — Luke 6:39-42 NIV

So, how do you remove the plank in your own eye? ... One speck at a time. That's why they call them spectacles! So, what would Jesus be like if He was raised in a wrecking yard, went to film school, and loved the Marx Brothers? He'd be all that but without the plank in His eye. In other words: He'd be me at my best and most blessed self. But, what if He were you? He created your uniqueness with purpose; so, why would He change it? He just wants to remove whatever prevents it from becoming its best self. Which is why, as Paul reminds his Ephesian congregation:





You were taught, with regard to your former [selfish] way of life, to put off your old [self-centered, self-serving, self-absorbed, self-destructive] self, which is being corrupted [NKJ: "which grows corrupt"] by its deceitful desires; to be made new [speck by speck and bit by Bit-O-Honey] in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new [self-aware, self-controlled, self-sacrificing, self-disciplined] self, created to be like God [would be if He were me] in true righteousness and holiness. — Ephesians 4:22-24 NIV

But then, isn't that *literally* the *oldest temptation* in the *book?* When:

The *serpent* said to the *woman* ... "When you *eat* of [the *tree*] your *eyes* will be *opened*, and you will be *like God*," – Genesis 3:1-5 NIV

So, were we created to be or not "to be like God"? Yes. To be and not to be. Notice Paul's qualification: "in true righteousness and holiness". Paul is telling the Ephesians to imitate God's nature by submitting to His authority. Whereas the enemy tempts us to usurp God's authority by succumbing to our nature. So don't fall for literally the oldest trick in the book!

Be *imitators* of *God*, therefore, [Paul tells his *Ephesian* friends] as *dearly loved children* [because, as a *rule*, dearly loved children *sincerely imitate* their *parents*] and *live* a *life* of *love*, [be like *that*] just as *Christ* loved *us* and *gave* Himself *up* for us – Ephesians 5:1-2 NIV



Paul planted and pastored the church in Ephesus for three years. And the theme of his later letter is to simply imitate Jesus like little children.



So, for our *Route 66* video (14.5 years ago!), we had everyone *imitate* Jesus. And there was a *bit* of a *backlash*. Because *some* found it *offensive*.



How do we expect massive, mature, character changes to occur in dearly loved children? Gradually. Incrementally. consistently. And then, Exponentially. And ultimately, permanently. If a toddler stops walking and goes back to crawling we'd rightly be concerned. As is our heavenly Father.

For though by this time you ought to be teachers, <u>you need someone to teach you again</u> the first principles of the oracles of God; and you have come [again] to need milk and not solid food ... [being] <u>unskilled</u> in the Word – Hebrews 5:12-13 NKJ

So it's crucial that we become like little children, and count the cost of consistency, and take solid, sacred, sustainable, subatomic, baby steps toward our true Christ-like self. Cuz Jesus said:

"Anyone who has faith in Me will do what I have been doing." - John 14:12 NIV

What's that? Miracles? Speaking in Aramaic? Wearing a Tallit and Tzitzit? "I've gotta find out what that is!" A disciple is just another way of saying an apprentice. And an apprentice is just a novice who job-shadows a master. And Jesus is quite clear as to what He came to do:

"I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." – John 10:10 NIV



"And for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth." – John 18:37 NIV

[And for this] "I have come into the world as a light" – John 12:46 NIV



"For I have come down ... to do the will of Him who sent Me." – John 6:38 NIV

[And] "I now send you ... to turn them from darkness to light" – Acts 26:17-18 NKJ









And, like Rome, a disciplined apprentice isn't built in a day. However, they are built in a daily routine. And that routine needs to start out subatomic in scope to give it the staying power to last long enough to change your identity. For instance, if you don't read your Bible, just be someone who opens their Bible. Literally. Just that. But every day. Till your nature takes it course and you're tempted to start reading. But then, don't flood the engine! Because, Mount Everest moments don't define our faith. But, dinky, daily, deliberate disciplines do. Because, they become habits. Which is why Jesus said:

"If you [actually] have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can [eventually] say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there' and [if it's God's will] it will move. [Cuz mountains are moved one teeny-tiny seed of faith at a time; and] Nothing will be impossible for you." – Matthew 17:20 NIV

That's not just poetic. It's procedural. Subatomic faith doesn't focus on the mountains you need to move tomorrow. It's focused on the microscopic seconds you need to make sacred today. Years ago, I did what Noah suggested: I put a Bible in my bathroom. But I didn't read it. So I got an audio Bible. But I didn't play it. So I wired it to the light switch! So, whatever you do, just do something! However small. Cuz you can't leave that little seed to fend for itself. Because:

The one who *received* the *seed* that *fell* among the *thorns* is the man who *hears* the *Word*, but the *worries* of this *life* and the *deceitfulness* of *wealth* choke it – Matthew 13:22 NIV

We can't avoid the worries of this life. But if that's our focus, they'll choke us. Plus they'll poke us! So tend to your tiny little seed. And it'll naturally grow. The solution isn't gritting your teeth. That's the Biblical description of hell! Just job-shadow Jesus within the existing rhythm of your life. And maybe use a dry-erase marker to write "PRAY" backwards on the outside of your shower door. Ever hear that STOP stands for Stomp Toe On Pedal; or Spin Tires On Pavement? Well how about: Short Time Of Prayer! And I mean short! Instead of coasting through and breaking the law, take a subatomic break to stop coasting through life, and take a two-second rest stop to pray: "Let's go!" The Pharisees had their own apprenticeship program – straining in vain to force every adherent to gnash their teeth and strive to become perfectly religious. And Jesus said:

"You travel over land and sea to win a single convert, and ... [then] you make him twice as much a son of hell as you are. Woe to you, blind guides!" – Matthew 23:15-16 NIV

"You load people down with [religious] burdens they can hardly carry" – Luke 11:46 NIV



[So] "Come to *Me*, all you who are *weary* and *burdened*, and I will *give* you *rest*. Take *My* yoke upon you and *learn* from *Me*, for I am *gentle*" – Matthew 11:28-29 NIV

But then He lays this biggie on His boys:

"You shall be perfect, just as your Father in heaven is perfect." - Matthew 5:48 NKJ

But [thankfully, we're also told to] let patience have its perfect work, that you may [speck by speck, eventually] be perfect and complete, [i.e.] lacking nothing. – James 1:4 NKJ

[When it comes to] The fruit of the Spirit [which] is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. – Galatians 5:22-23 NIV

[So just] Walk as [little] children of light [who simply job-shadow Jesus] (for the fruit of the Spirit is in all goodness, righteousness, and truth) – Ephesians 5:8-9 NKJ

Little *children* ... [don't *freak out*] Whoever *practices* righteousness *is* righteous, as He is righteous. [Cuz that's *all* He *asks*] ... No one *born* of *God* makes a *practice* of *sinning*, for God's *seed abides* in him, and [as it *grows* in the *attitude* of his *mind*] he *cannot* [just] *keep* on *sinning* [cuz it'll become *less* and less *appealing*; and *more* and more *repelling*] ... By this [growing seed] it is evident [over time] who are the *children* of God ... [because] whoever does *not* [even] *practice* righteousness is *not* of God – 1 John 3:7-10 ESV

[So] Choose for yourselves <u>this day</u> whom you will serve [in whatever subatomic way] ... But as for me and my house, [and my bathroom] we will serve the Lord. – Joshua 24:15 NKJ



"For My yoke is easy and My burden is light." – Matthew 11:30 NIV

When you're doing it right. Because **He** asks us to tend to just one little seed at a time. Cuz we're a lot like Peter, when Jesus just wanted to wash his feet. First Peter said no. Until Jesus said:

"Unless I wash you, you won't belong to Me." Simon Peter exclaimed, "Then wash my hands and head as well, Lord, not just my feet!" Jesus replied, [Hold on there, tiger] "A person who has bathed all over does not need to wash, except for the [daily bits and specks of dirt on their] feet, to be entirely clean. And [rest assured] you disciples [who belong to Me; by allowing Me to simply wash your feet] are clean" – John 13:8-10 NLT

Because in *His* apprenticeship *program*, you become a *journeyman* the *moment* you *begin*. So, why not allow the *Master* to *serve* you as His child and friend, and *simply* and *consistently* begin to *practice* a *moment* of His *presence*. And do so with the astonishingly easily obtainable goal of gradually forming a sacred habit, one small step of faith at a time. And just follow Him by allowing Him to walk in your shoes. Because, as it turns out, the most real you will be the fully trained version, that's clearly functioning in your created uniqueness and purpose.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
