## When Panic Attacks



Finding Clarity in Adversity
September 21, 2025

Today we're learning how to hear God through our adversity, anxiety, and anger. Cuz everything in this world declares the glory of God [ROM 1:20; PS 19:1] and this world is full of adversity, anxiety, and anger! So, if God is God, all the hard stuff we suffer has gotta be revealing His goodness, kindness, and justice in one way or another — so the question we're all asking is this: How?











Cuz sometimes, it's hard to see. And it sure feels like this is one of those times. And I'm feeling sick about it. Cuz for a while, we've been a country with deep political division, conflicting moral outrage, and pain as far as the eye can see. And while we all watched the apathy of this world subtly undermine the hope of our faith — our brothers, sisters, and children have been slowly suffocated by the sadness and cynicism of a culture that has lowered its standards so radically — that surrender to our struggles now qualifies as success. So let's set the record straight: we're not here to settle for less; we're here to reach for more! Cuz

Greater is He that is in you, than he that is in the world. – 1 John 4:4 KJV

And in a time of *addiction* to *apathy*, Charlie Kirk's death seems to have *shaken* almost everyone *out* of *complacency*. Cuz *regardless* of *how* you view his personal *politics* or *faith*— no one can deny the *courage* in *his convictions* or the *injustice* of his *murder*. And *regardless* of *how* this situation has *manifested* as *adversity*, *anxiety*, or *anger* in *your* life, I think we can all agree that *at minimum*— **it's a victory** over *apathy*.

And that should be proof that God's still on the throne – cuz His battle has always been with our heart – and the apathy of a lukewarm life is the ultimate enemy of our Ally who fights for us to feel both the courage to have hope – and the satisfaction of real victory. So, if you're having a hard time finding your footing while this world is rocked by storm after storm, I hate to tell you, but God's got you right where He wants you.

Cuz storms don't create confusion about who has control, they create clarity in where to find it.

[Just listen to how Paul puts it:] We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about the troubles we experienced ... We were under great pressure, far beyond our ability to endure ... Indeed, we felt we had received the sentence of death. But this happened that we might not rely on ourselves but on God, who raises the dead. – 2 Corinthians 1:8-9 NIV

You ever been on a *boat* in the middle of a *storm?* Lord knows I have! It was the closest I think *I've* come to death, *twice!* Cuz when you're *long-lining* in the middle of the night in the North Pacific *without* any land in sight, your *boat* is your whole *world*. And when 30 *foot swells* rock your 28-foot world, you reflexively reach out for something to keep you steady.











And one of those times, I was hanging off the edge of our boat to try and grab a buoy at the end of a 5 mile line — and stumbling in the dark, I reached for a rope that I thought was tied tightly to the cabin. So, when the slack let out, I was leaning so far over the edge that each boat-rocking wave dipped me into the black abyss. Terrifying. But the moral of the story is twofold: 1. Storms expose what we trust to steady us and 2. Storms expose if what we trust is trustworthy.

Cuz, it's only when we experience *crisis* in this world that we're *stripped* of the *illusion* of having *control* and we're forced to reach out and put our faith in something other than ourself. Cuz **faith starts** with reaching out but reaching out starts in adversity.

And I've always loved the way Tim Keller paints the same picture: Imagine you're standing on a cliff right as it gives out and you slip off the edge. And as you start to fall, you spot a branch. What do you do? Do you pause to see what kind of tree it is so you can research the wood density and what kind of root system it has? No! You grab it! That's how crisis compels us to reach out in faith — and that's when we can see that we're not saved by the intensity of our faith, we're saved by the object of our faith. And often times it's only after we reach out in desperation that we experience faith's confirmation. Cuz the longer the branch holds you through your emergency, the more confidence you have in the strength it has to save you. So, why wouldn't God allow adversity if it led to trusting His strength to save?!

Like Corrie ten Boom said: "We don't realize Jesus is all we need until Jesus is all we have."

And that's what we talked about last week in the stories of the disciples *struggling* against *their* storms: God can use the *panic* of our peril to *prove* there's *power* behind our faith:

[To recap:] Suddenly a furious storm came up on the lake, so that the waves swept over the boat. But Jesus was sleeping. The disciples went and woke Him, saying, "Lord, save us! We're going to drown!" He replied, "You of little faith, why are you so afraid?" Then He got up and rebuked the winds and the waves, and it was completely calm. – Matthew 8:24-26 NIV


And that's how a tiny mustard seed of faith can turn our anxiety into God's glory: we just treat His branch as our best bet so reaching out for Him is our reflex to worry. Cuz once we do, we know He's worthy of trust. But the scary truth is, we don't know if our faith has the strength to save us until we need saving. So God takes advantage of our adversity cuz suffering transforms our perception of God into an encounter with God. When we have to rely on Him, faith changes from an idea to an experience. And unfortunately, it's usually after our problems exceed our ability that we're willing to reach out in faith and say, "Lord, save us! We're going to drown!"

But that's not the *only* way we reach out. And if we read the exact same story in Mark, we can see some subtle differences in the hearts of the same disciples that should convict each one of us:

A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke Him and said to Him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm. – Mark 4:37-39 NIV

Did you spot the difference? "Lord, save us! We're going to drown!" became "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" And although verbiage is close, the heart behind each reach is a million miles apart. Cuz when each of us chooses our response to adversity, it's not just what we reach for, but how we reach. Cuz in every storm, each reach has two options: we can cry out or we can lash out. And sometimes it can appear as a razor-thin line, but we need to acknowledge it's always a deadly-dangerous decision.







So, have you hesitated? When you started scrolling through your feed after Charlie was shot, and found out that the wounds to our nation were deeper than you imagined, was your instinct to steady yourself by *crying* out to a God you trust is in control – or did the *disparity* lead your heart to *lash out* at God by subtly questioning His control?



Well, regardless of your *response*, right *now* we need to *weigh* our hearts on an *honest* scale; and *here's* how: ask *yourself who's really in charge*.

Is God your supervisor or just an advisor? Are you taking things into your own hands cuz God's taking too long to do what you think He should do – or are you trusting Him to guide your steps – even if it takes you somewhere you don't want to go? Ask yourself: if He asked you to wash the feet of your assassin, would you do it? Cuz Jesus did [Jn 13:5]. And if you've already drawn your sword against your enemy and lashed out, would you obey Jesus if He told you to put it away so He could heal them before they kill Him? Cuz He's done that too [Luk 22:50-51]. And would you believe that sometimes enduring injustice might be the biggest weapon in a more important war? Cuz

Jesus said, "My kingdom is *not* of *this* world. <u>If it were, My servants would fight</u> to prevent my arrest by the Jewish leaders. But now My kingdom is from *another place*." – John 18:36 NIV

For indeed, the kingdom of God is within you. – Luke 17:21 NKJ

And *that's* where us servants *are* supposed to stand up and fight cuz, like we said at the start: **God's battle has always been with our heart!** Cuz *that's* the *source* of *all* other war:

What *causes* fights and quarrels <u>among you?</u> Don't they come from your *desires* that battle <u>within you?</u> – James 4:1 NIV

So when conflict shakes our country, all that means is the spiritual war for our hearts is at our door.









And if you see yourself on the side of Jesus, you need to recognize that putting love in your heart is how God puts a weapon in your hand! Cuz loving the person right in front of you — especially the one you want to fight — is how you demonstrate the power of having Jesus on the throne. And when our enemies witness how steady we are in the storm, their same hurting human heart starts to consider crying out instead instead of lashing out. And that's how we "win."

We don't conquer people; we win hearts to the King. And or love is our protest, our strategy, and our strength. So don't do like Peter and swing a sword thinking you're defending the Lord; that's not courage – that's confusion. And it happens when we're blinded by rage instead of focused by our faith. real courage is bearing a cross for your enemy to show that you share in the same pain that they're trying to treat – but you found a Savior with enough strength to endure the suffering! And every act of enemy-love becomes a banner on this battlefield that tells everyone else the army of Jesus is advancing with enough power to overwhelm every enemy and overturn every heart! Cuz He keeps holding all who hold up others; He supplies endless mercy to all who are merciful to others; and He shares victory with all who surrender vengeance on others.

Listen, there's no doubt about it: **our country and this** *whole world* is **experiencing a** *storm*. In fact, there's a *good chance* it might be one of the most *pivotal* moments in *human history*. So, it might *also* be one of the most *important moments* to find the *courage* of *your faith*. And I'm *not* here to tell you *how* to feel about all this – but I *am* here to tell you to bring *what* you feel to Jesus. And I'm not here to tell you exactly *what* you're supposed to *do* now – but I *am* here to tell you to do *something* now! Because *that's* why we're here; to *process* our *feelings* and *choose* our *response*. And all we know for certain is that *our* response *must* be built on *truth*, rooted in *love*, and focused on *Jesus* or it *won't* hold you through all the *adversity*, *anxiety*, and *anger*.

But, if we can hang on to our faith as the storms keep raging, the adversity will expose what we trust and it will prove whether it's trustworthy. And that reveals God's goodness as the One who actually holds when everything else gives way. Anxiety will uncover our need for a better peace and lead us to encounter God's kindness as the One who meets us with calm, not condemnation. And anger will show us God's justice by redirecting vengeance from our hands to His cross. Cuz storms don't create confusion about who has control; they create clarity in where to find it.

Peace I leave with you; *My peace* I give *you*. I do not give to you [weak answers] as the world gives. [So] Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. – John 14:27 NIV

And don't be *surprised* when the world around you seems full of *cruelty*, *injustice*, and *evil* – cuz our *mistakes* make this place a *broken world*, but **God can make faith** *from our mistakes!* We just have to be committed to *crying out for God* to build *our* faith in *His* strength – and **we have** to stop *lashing out* when *His* plan doesn't meet *our* expectations; cuz *that's* putting faith in *our judgment* over *His; that's reaching* for an *insecure* rope on the *edge* of an *abyss;* and *that's* choosing the *cliff* over the *branch*. But *right now* – this world *needs* to see that *our branch* provides *steadiness* through every *storm*, and has enough *strength* to *save* every single *soul!*
