The Commission to Go Fishin'
October 5, 2025

Today we're tackling our call to stand tall in the Great Commission to go fishin'!

Over 30 of you came to our *Conversations* event last *Sunday*, to practice a *simple approach* to *sharing* the *Gospel* (a.k.a. the *Good News*). And **there's a surge of standing up and speaking out currently sweeping our nation.** So, I want to jump in and begin by asking each of us to ask ourselves: Am I up to the task? Cuz this is what makes life worth living – according to Paul:











The Holy Spirit warns me in town after town that imprisonment and persecutions are waiting for me. But I do not consider my life worth anything to myself, so that I may finish my task and [what's that task, you ask?] the ministry that I [and we] received from the Lord Jesus, [i.e.] to testify to the good news of God's grace. — Acts 20:23-24 NET

[Cuz like Paul and all those saved by grace] [God] reconciled us to Himself through [faith in] Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: [testifying] that God was reconciling the world to Himself in Christ, [and] not counting people's sins against them. – 2 Corinthians 5:18-19 NIV

We are therefore Christ's [good news] ambassadors – 2 Corinthians 5:20 NIV

"For God so *loved* the *world* that He gave His *one* and only *Son*, that whoever *believes* in Him shall not *perish* but have eternal *life*." – John 3:16 NIV

[And His one and only Son said] "A new commandment I give to you, that ... just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. [Because] By this [force] all people will know that you are My disciples" – John 13:34-35 ESV

Ever accidentally tell someone you love 'em? I did. I told a nice lady at a paint store. I often say, "Love ya, bye," on the phone, or "See ya; love ya," in person to those I hold dear. But I just bought some paint. And she said, "Thank you." and I said, "Love ya, see ya later," and turned to go and realized what I'd done, and turned back and said, "I say 'love ya' to my ... that I ... guess I love you!" And she threw her arms out, laughing, and said, "I love you too!" And it was funny and heartwarming. And as I got in my car, I realized that it was a true, brotherly, Freudian slip.

"So wherever you go in the world, [share the love and get ready to] tell [anyone and] everyone the Good News [of God's love and grace and compassion]." – Mark 16:15 NOG

[Because] We are <u>witnesses</u> ... [cuz] He commissioned us to ... <u>testify</u> that He is the One appointed by God as <u>Judge</u> ... [and] [the <u>Good News</u> is] that everyone who <u>believes</u> in Him will <u>receive forgiveness</u> of <u>sins</u> [by God's <u>grace</u> through our <u>faith</u>] – Acts 10:39-43 NAB

This is clearly, definitively, distinctly courtroom terminology.













So why is it, when we hear that we're called, commanded, and commissioned to be a witness to the world, we recoil at the thought of the dreaded knock; or we picture an extrovert on a street corner? I'm not knocking anyone; I'm just saying it's odd that we don't picture a witness stand. You might say, "That's still intimidating." I'm not saying it's not. But that's how it's presented. And if you think about it, it's actually, oddly, comforting. Because, a witness doesn't argue the case, or push for a verdict, or bring a conviction, or jump up and say, "Listen up; I'm a witness!" No. They just share what they know when asked to take the stand. Until then, they sit quietly and wait patiently and watch closely and listen intently and speak softly in their own words. And you know what else is just like that? Fishing! Which is why:

Jesus called out, [and still calls out] "Come along with Me and I will show you how to fish for the souls of men!" – Matthew 4:19 TLB

[So] Make it your ambition to [sit quietly] lead a quiet life, [and] to mind your own business [of maturing in trusting in the hope you have; because the full force of our true task of testifying is best seen in our worst trials] ... so that your [consistent] daily life may win the respect of outsiders [who'll desire the peace you naturally display] – 1 Thessalonians 4:11-12 NIV

[So] Do not be frightened [of the fish]. But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. [Which means to] Always be prepared [wait patiently, watch closely, and listen intently] to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason [your Scriptures and your firsthand story] for the hope [they want] that you [obviously] have. But [speak softly] do this with gentleness and respect [and you'll have nothing to be afraid of] – 1 Peter 3:14-15 NIV

Did you know Pops was a fishing guide? I loved launching the boat, riding in the boat, eating burgers dad barbecued on the boat; and catching fish, reeling 'em in, and netting 'em. But I hated fish-ING: the sit quietly, wait patiently, watch closely, listen intently, and speak softly part. Not how I roll, daddy-o! I was often told: Calm down or you'll scare the fish. Truer words were never spoken. We're called to be bold but not brash. And passionate but not pushy. And courageous but not careless. "You need to get SAVED!" "Well, YOU need to get LOST!" Because fish hate being caught!

[Because] This is the *verdict*: *Light* has come *into* the *world*, but *people* ... will *not* come *into* the *light* for *fear* that their *deeds* will be *exposed*. – John 3:19-20 NIV

As Shar can attest, I often speak for the fish in survival shows, like "Alone". When they catch one and say, "Thank you for your sacrifice." I say, "You're not welcome!" Cuz, it makes Shar laugh. But when folks see the shining proof of your faith in the form of peace in your daily trials – big or small – they'll bite and thank you! Cuz without Christ, true peace is out of reach; cuz shame is relentless, and success is hollow, and life is pointless, and death is doom. That's the bad news that we all share down here. So don't expect a nibble till they see your proof of your hope beyond the grave.

[Because] Faith is the [visible, seeable] substance of things hoped for, [in Christ, in Scripture; making it] the evidence of things not seen. [In your heart] – Hebrews 11:1 NKJ

"But, what if I don't have an answer?" I don't know. What do you usually do? I say, "I don't know." So do that. Shows humility. Earns credibility. And it's what witnesses are expected to say when they're unsure. But do figure out the reason for the hope you have. Cuz if your faith is based on hearsay, it won't hold up — on the stand, before the judge, or in the trials of life. So:



See [for yourself] how great a love the Father has bestowed on us, [literally: find it, read it, learn it, and own it] that we would be called children of God [by His grace through our faith in His Son]; and such we are [because of the blood of Christ]. For this reason the world does not know us, [understand us] because it did not know Him. ... [But] By this the children of God ... are obvious: anyone who does not practice righteousness is not [a child] of God, nor the one who does not love [as Christ loved us. Because that's the #1 way we practice it!] ... [And] Do not be surprised ... if the world hates you. — 1 John 3:1, 10-14 NAS

That doesn't let you off the hook. Cuz we can't shy away. Just like on the witness stand, "I don't know" is allowed. But "I'm too shy" is contempt. Because shyness has little to do with courage. If you saw a stranger's toddler falling into a fire pit, would you be too shy to act? Of course not. Because, to paraphrase 1 John 4:18, there is no shyness in love, because love drives out shyness.

Therefore, since [we know that] we have been <u>justified</u> through <u>faith</u>, [and I'm <u>just-if-I'd</u> <u>never sinned!</u>] we have <u>peace</u> with <u>God</u> through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have <u>gained access</u> by <u>faith into this grace</u> in which we now <u>stand</u>. – Romans 5:1-2 NIV

Do you stand firm in the peace of God's grace? You should. Because, to have access is to have acceptance and approval. And not the formal access granted to a subject before a king, but the access of a child boldly bypassing all formality to come to their father who happens to be a king.



Let us therefore [as God's children] come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help [us stand] in time of need [of peace]. – Hebrews 4:16 NKJ



We had two cats that we got at the Humane Society: Tiger and Lightbulb. That's Tiger laying down. She'd roll over and expose her stomach — a cat compliment of trust. I could stamp my foot next to her, and she wouldn't flinch. When we'd pull in the driveway, she'd run out, and roll over, and block us! Honking had no effect. I rolled up really slow to see how close I could get before she'd move. And all she did was meow when the tire started to pinch her tail! Because that cat knew that she knew she could trust us. This other, on the other hand, is Lightbulb. Not really. But I don't have a good photo, because he was scared to death of us. For years. On rare occasions, if we sat real still with a hand hanging over the couch, he'd work up the nerve to nuzzle it. And then he'd lay next to Tiger, peacefully, on the carpet. But the moment we moved, he'd panic. Tiger knew the peace that far surpassed her understanding. But Lightbulb never knew the joy of the trust in our love.



So, do you stand firm, like a Tiger, in the grace of God's peace? Or are you still a scaredy cat?

We have "gained access by faith into this grace" of peace "in which we now stand" ...

And we rejoice in the hope of the glory of God. – Romans 5:2 NIV

[And remember] It is the glory of God to conceal things – Proverbs 25:2 ESV

[Which is why] [The Lord says] "My ways are <u>far beyond anything you could imagine</u>." – Isaiah 55:8 NLT

[And why Paul says] You will <u>know Christ's love</u>, which goes <u>far beyond any knowledge</u>. ... [Because, the <u>concealed</u>] <u>Glory belongs to God</u>, whose <u>power</u> [of <u>love</u>] is at <u>work</u> in <u>us</u>. [And] <u>By this power</u> [of Christ's <u>love</u>] He can do <u>infinitely more than we can <u>ask or imagine</u>. [Because the] <u>Glory</u> [of the <u>concealed</u>] <u>belongs to God</u> – Ephesians 3:19-21 GWT</u>

Therefore, "we rejoice in the hope of the [unimaginable] glory [of the concealed things] of God" ...

[And] Not only so, but [because of our hope in the unrevealed, unimaginable, concealed things of God] we also rejoice in our sufferings, [not "for" our sufferings – we're not masochists – but in the midst of them] because we know that suffering produces perseverance; [to grit our teeth and trust in God's glory and cry out like the man who said to Jesus, "I believe, but help my unbelief" (Mk 9:24); and] perseverance, [produces] character; [the maturity to trust in God's glory without gritting our teeth in unbelief; like Tiger] and character, [produces greater and stronger] hope. [In the concealed things of God; because our hope in the unseen grows as we experience the reality of our own authenticity in affliction, and the surpassing value of peace and grace and access and hope] And hope [in the glory of God] does not disappoint us – Romans 5:3-5 NIV

Because biblical hope isn't wishful thinking. That's what unbiblical hope amounts to. It's trust in the unseen in light of the power and love displayed. Which is why we should be the most hopeful people on the planet! We have peace. And grace. And access. And hope beyond the grave.







A year ago, we welcomed Mark and Peggy DiSalle: movie producers who joined us on a Sunday after watching us online. Mark passed away last month. And I attended his memorial last week. And Peggy hugged me and cried and said, "He's in a better place." And I said, "Know what I want on my tombstone? So long suckers!" And she burst out laughing and double high-fived me. Know why? Because she and we have a glorious, joyful, grace-based hope beyond the grave! But do you care to share? Because Jesus said:

"You <u>will receive power</u> [to <u>love</u> as <u>He loves</u>] when the Holy Spirit <u>has</u> come upon you; and you <u>will be My witnesses</u> [that's the <u>task</u> and the <u>force</u>] in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, <u>and to the ends of the earth</u>." – Acts 1:8 NRS

And here we are! In the northwest corner of what would've been their inconceivable description of the ends of the earth. So, how's it feel to be stationed at the outermost outpost on this corner of God's Kingdom? Hopefully, like you're up to the task! Because deep down, everyone aches to escape the darkness. Because who doesn't want hope and peace and freedom from guilt? So:

Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace [and maybe even a "Love ya!"] – Colossians 4:5-6 NIV

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
