You Turn



Killing the Me-First Mentality
November 9, 2025

Today we're learning how God uses other people to kill our pride! Cuz the fatal flaw of our flesh that causes all the suffering of our sin – is our arrogant ego! And until someone puts it down, there's no room on the throne for the rightful King to reign! So, Have you been dethroned?













You sure? Or do you still have one cheek on God's chair in an effort to stay in charge? Cuz that was the convicting question I heard in Bruce's sermon last week when he made us examine whether our response to God's kindness was a soft-hearted "Thy will be done" or a hard-hearted "My will be done." And after an honest assessment, I gotta say, I wasn't thrilled with how much sway my flesh still has over my heart — cuz we all know the key to living our best life is having the right King. Therefore,

In your hearts [you must always] revere Christ as Lord. – 1 Peter 3:15 NIV

So, why is it so hard to soften our hearts to His commands – even after we believe He's got the plan for our perfection? Well... ayone who still tries to call the shots after an invitation to follow a flawless leader, must be either stupid, scared, or selfish. So take your pick – I did! Ask, am I holding on to control because my mind is stupidly choosing a shallow, short-sighted perception; is my heart still scared of what I'll lose or the pain of change; or is my flesh so selfish that it prefers the false comfort of control to the true satisfaction of surrender? Fun exercise, huh?!

Don't worry, it's part of the process and *Jesus* reveals our *diagnosis* and *treatment*: **pride makes us stupid**, **scared**, **and selfish**; so **it's gotta go!**

"Whoever wants to be My disciple <u>must deny themselves</u> and take up their cross and *follow Me*. For whoever wants to save their life *will* lose it, but <u>whoever loses their life *for Me* will find it. – Matthew 16:24-25 NIV</u>

For we know that our *old self* was crucified with [Christ] so that the body ruled by sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin [cuz when we kill the old you, pride goes too!] – Romans 6:6-7 NIV

And all of the *stupid*, *scared*, and *selfish barriers* to a *better life* with a *better Lord* just *disappear* when we learn to *let go* of our earthly ego; the way John the Baptist famously *explained* God's plan:

[Jesus] must increase, but I must decrease. – John 3:30 NKJ

So, whether you *already believe* that's true or you're willing to *test* that truth for a taste of what it actually *produces*, *here's* the million dollar question: *How?* How do we *kill pride* to *soften* our *hearts?*

Well, last week *Bruce* gave a bunch of great ideas: stop *judging*, take a *knee* and *pray* for help, let the Spirit *nudge you*, let the Bible *break you*, and *see* all the struggle as God keeping your clay *warm* enough to finish *working you* into *His masterpiece!* But, I'd like to add another option; *socialize*.



God's primary tool to kill pride – is people. Cuz pride hides in isolation but gets revealed in relationships. And you can feel humble alone – but our community proves our humility. So God put us in close proximity – not just to gauge our pride – but to practice the humbling process that prepares our heart to be filled with His will over ours! Like James says:

Humble yourselves before the Lord, and He will lift you up. [How?] Brothers and sisters, do not slander one another. [Cuz] Anyone who speaks against a brother or sister or judges them speaks against the law and judges it. [And] When you judge the law, you are not keeping it, but sitting in judgment on it [as judge]. [But,] There is only one Lawgiver and Judge, the One who is able to save and destroy... who are you to judge your neighbor? – James 4:6-12 NIV

[So,] All of you, clothe yourselves with <u>humility toward one another</u>, because, "God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble." Humble yourselves, therefore, <u>under God's mighty hand</u>, <u>[in your community]</u> that He may <u>[be able to]</u> lift you up in due time. – 1 Peter 5:5-6 NIV



Both James and Paul point out that to let God lead – the humility we need comes from practicing with people. Cuz if we can master a selfless posture with imperfect people, our earthly ego will get worn down enough for our supernatural spirit to waken up and be taken up!



You ever use a rock tumbler? It's crazy how they reveal *every* ordinary pebble has a *hidden beauty* – but you ever think about *how* they work? Toss in *jagged* stones, a little *water*, a little *grit*, turn it on, and *walk away*. And it's *loud* and *messy* all night – but the stones are *perfect* and *polished* by morning. Well, if you haven't *noticed*, this *world* is *God's* rock tumbler.

[Because,] As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another. – Proverbs 27:17 NIV

But, as great as *smoothing* and *sharpening* sounds, there's some *subtext* we *also* need to *hear: First*, this means we're *all* a little *dull* and *unrefined*. Cuz you *can't hone* or *polish* what's already *sharp* and *shiny* – so before your *pride* tells you that you *still* have *your edge*, remember *this* blunt truth:

All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God – Romans 3:23 NIV



However, because you don't sharpen a sword with another sword, the second insight we need to hear is sometimes you're a sword and sometimes you're a tool. Which means we're called to play both roles; the one patiently putting up with someone grinding off our imperfections — and the abrasive tool who someone else endures to sharpen their spirit.



And *that* is one of the most *humbling* realities *I've* ever had to accept. Cuz we tend to *focus* on how much *we've grown* instead of how much we *make others groan*. But, **I'm somebody's sandpaper**. And *their patience* with *my imperfection* is making *them* more *sharp* and *shiny!*

Just ask my wife! She'll tell you I'm a master class in producing her patience – so much so, that I'm pretty sure she thinks that Jesus telling us to "Love your enemies" might be marriage counseling. And the only thing that keeps that from being an intolerable attack on my ego, is how humbled I've already been by others – in fact, at some point two of my best friends both revealed that they originally thought I was an obnoxious jerk before they warmed up to me. Ouch! But good to know. Cuz humility helped me see that without pride, conflict can be more constructive than destructive.

It's only when *pride* is *present* that our time in the tumbler *feels* destructive cuz that "me-*first* mentality" naturally rubs others the wrong way and makes it hard to co-exist in close quarters.









Remember back when everybody was divided on the Covid vaccine and as that snowballed into more and more profound political opposition? I had a number of talks with people who wanted to move away to places more aligned with what they already believed — and every time I asked the same question, "What if everybody did that?" We'd just sit around and pat each other on the back for how right we already were... and that's not constructive or destructive; it's stagnant. And that's the worst, cuz at least conflict can grow into cooperation but nothing grows by stagnation.

It takes action, reaction, and interaction for things to grow — including love! So remember, friction isn't the failure of love; it's the forge of love. And God put us in this tumbler on purpose cuz forcing us to get along is how our rough spots get polished off and our heart learns to make room for others. Cuz when God's kids won't try to get along, He helps the exact same way my friend did with his kids; I told you this a while back, but whenever they started fighting, he just got out the "Big Shirt" and the kids would both have to wear it until the fighting stopped. And it worked like a charm, because just being in the "Big Shirt" teaches the same lesson real fast: harmony with others is always in my best interest.

So God designed this world with different people sharing the same space to force us to learn earthly ego creates conflict but spiritual unity produces peace. Cuz that's when God's love begins to grow.

[As Paul explains] Love must be sincere. [So,] Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in love... Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer... [all so you can] Live in harmony with one another. [Which mostly means] Do not be proud... [But instead,] If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. – Romans 12:9-18 NIV

[And since our selfless unity is essential to experiencing God's sincere love, we must] Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. – Ephesians 4:3 NIV



Cuz the unity with the *Spirit* that we *all* share begins with unity with the *community* we *all* share. And we can't have *that* until "me" becomes "we." *Otherwise*, we're doomed to the same fate as *Narcissus* – cuz *he* was so *fixated* on his *own reflection* that he couldn't tear himself away – and that self-centered *stagnation* ended up starving him to death!

It sounds like a dark *comedy* – but it should *also* ring out as *a real warning*: **self-focus** *feeds* **our flesh but** *starves* **our spirit**. But that should sound both *convicting* and *encouraging* – cuz if self-centeredness is the common *cause*, then prying our eyes *off* ourselves is the common *cure*. **If attention to our ego** *doesn't* **decrease our** *spirit* **will** *starve*.



So, how does the flesh *die to self?* **Start by dying to selfies!** *That is*, realize *you* don't *need* to be the *center* of *every* picture! Call me crazy, but when I was a kid – barely any photos had a *single* person in them; we took photos of the landscape *alone*, the *others* we were *with*, and the *experiences* we *shared* – yet *now*, it feels like we want to measure our life by how *things* relate to *us* instead of how *we* relate to *things*. But, God's **creation isn't just for** *confirmation*, **but** *confrontation*.

It's *not* just meant to show you how awesome *you are*, but how awesome *God is;* to *awaken* our spirit's higher desire for someone *better* than our flesh on the throne. Cuz **our spirit** has an appetite for the *fulfilling* harmony of *unity* – cuz *it* knows that *we need each other* to be *complete* – and we need to be complete to be *in Christ!*

For where you have envy and selfish ambition, there you find disorder and every evil practice. – James 3:16 NIV

[So,] Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others. – Philippians 2:3–4 NIV

[Cuz] [Jesus] died for *all*, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for Him who died for them and was raised again. – 2 Corinthians 5:15 NIV

[Which is why] He must become greater; I must become less. – John 3:30 NIV

[Cuz] From Him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work. – Ephesians 4:16 NIV

[So don't let pride let you think you're all you need] The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" – 1 Corinthians 12:21 NIV

Cuz we're all in this thing together! And the sooner we realize that's a good thing, the sooner we'll soften to each other and the sooner pride will move out so Christ can move in. Cuz unity is the poison that kills pride. But, unity isn't uniformity. Eyes, elbows, knees, and toes are all wildly different and often create conflict when they don't cooperate – but when they're unified to work as one body under one Head, life gets good! Cuz that's when we discover that harmony is the source of happiness. So stop saying, "Relationships are hard" or "Marriage is a lot of work" – cuz that's just not true – unity is hard, surrendering is hard, and killing our pride is hard – but in a crowded world like this, relationships just happen on their own! But they only get good when we make the "you turn" that changes "me-first" into "you first" – cuz that grows into "God first" – and that's when He can finally lead you to the life you always wanted, cuz that's when you finally get both cheeks off His chair!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
