Purple Reign



When Our Blues Meet His Blood

November 30, 2025

Today we're talking about dying to our selfish self and living with undying love and joy and peace!

So: **How was your Thanksgiving?** Not the holiday, Noah's directive from Paul last Sunday, to:











Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. [So] Do not be anxious about anything, but in every [frustrating] situation, by prayer and ... thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God ... will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. — Philippians 4:4-7 NIV

Know why hostilities and holidays and anxieties go together so well? Cuz that's how God wants it. Siblings and spouses are sacred sandpaper, as are Grandma Grudgey, Grandpa Drinky, Auntie Anti-Semite, and Uncle Paul ... itics, and everyone who causes friction and rubs you the wrong way. So, the choice between light and dark goes way beyond the turkey meat! Cuz when these turkeys don't make you happy, let 'em make you holy! Because those who sit before you have been set before you to challenge you to endure and enjoy.

[Therefore] let us *run* with *endurance* the [*joyful*] <u>race</u> [to the *throne* of *God*] that is <u>set</u> before <u>us</u>, [by] fixing our eyes on Jesus ... who for the joy set before <u>Him</u> endured the cross ... and has <u>sat down</u> at ... the throne of <u>God</u>. For consider Him who has endured such hostility by sinners against Himself, [consider Him] so that you will not grow weary and lose heart. – Hebrews 12:1-3 NAS

[Consider how] They put a purple robe on Him, then twisted together a crown of thorns and set it on Him. And they began to call out to Him, "Hail, king of the Jews!" [And] Again and again they struck Him on the head with a staff and spit on Him. – Mark 15:17-19 NIV

[Consider Him, because] He was pierced for our transgressions ... [And] the punishment that brought us peace was upon Him, and by His wounds we are healed. – Isaiah 53:5 NIV

So, what do you bring to the table: a piece of your mind or a peace of your heart? Cuz if Jesus could endure the hostility of the cross – we should try to endure the hostility of cross words.

"For I have *come* to *set* a man against his *father*, and a *daughter* against her *mother* ... And a person's *enemies* will be *those* of his *own household*." – Matthew 10:35-36 ESV

For by one sacrifice He has made perfect forever those who are being made holy.

So, if they're not making you happy, they better be making you holy! So, try to "Rejoice in the Lord always" and "do not be anxious about anything". When Uncle Paul wrote this to the Philippians, he was chained to a Roman guard under house arrest after being incarcerated. (Acts 28:16)



It was ancient Rome's version of an ankle monitor. This is our first joyful story. Cuz that's the barracks of the Palace Guard in charge of Paul. And here's a selfie "taken" just eight years before Paul wrote to the Philippians that:



What has happened to me [being chained to a guard] has really served to advance the Gospel. [Because] As a result, it has become clear throughout the whole palace guard ... that I am in chains for Christ. ... And because of this I rejoice. Yes, and I will continue to rejoice — Philippians 1:12-18 NIV

Because, who's chained to who? Depends on who's changing who. So, who's chained to you? Paul turned his misery into ministry. How about you? Don't just complain about the ol' ball-and-chain, minister! And grow in holiness! And die to selfishness! And live with joyfulness! And rejoice!



The second story is about a messenger who was sent from Phlippi to comfort and assist Paul in Rome. But the guy got so sick that he almost literally died to self, and Paul had to care for him. That's not the funny part. The hilarious part is that before Paul wraps up his letter with "again: Rejoice" and "do not be anxious about anything," he writes:

With regard to *Epaphroditus* [that's *either* his *name* or what he *had*] ... I *consider* it *necessary* to *send* him [back] to *you*. For he has been ... *distressed* [you know, *anxious*] because *you heard* that he was *ill*. He was *indeed* ill, *close* to *death* ... [I *send* him] [back] so that, on *seeing* him, you may *rejoice again*, and *I* may have *less anxiety*. – Philippians 2:25-28 NAB

Turns out, after you pray with thanksgiving, you still gotta send some folks home! Any of those at your Thanksgiving? If not, it might've been you! And I like to think they all had a good laugh at this:

For the joy of the Lord is your strength. - Nehemiah 8:10 NIV

[So] Continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling – Philippians 2:12 NIV

[And] I will continue with all of you for your progress and joy in the faith – Philippians 1:25 NIV

And after *Paul* worked out *this situation* by putting *Epaphroditus* on a *bus*, he *adds*:

Welcome him then in the Lord with all joy and hold such people in esteem, because for the sake of the Work of Christ he came close to death – Philippians 2:25-30 NAB

Because the saved still get sick and die and have anxiety! Even if they're good with God!

For it has been *granted* to *you* [Philippians and *all* believers] on *behalf* of *Christ* <u>not only to believe on Him</u>, but <u>also to suffer for Him</u> – Philippians 1:27-29 NIV



For the simple reason that suffering doesn't discredit God's power, it opens a door to display it. Which most often has the deepest impact, and leaves the most indelible impression. Which is certainly the case in our third joyful story which most likely involves this ancient Philippian prison, and a jailer who personifies salvation with fear and trembling.

Because one of the *Philippians* to whom Paul – while *under arrest* in *Rome* – is *writing,* is his *former jailer* who – *ten years before* – *died* to *self,* just *after* almost *killing* himself, just *after* God *opened all* the *doors* to *display* His *power, just* after *Paul* and *Silas* were *severely beaten* with *rods*.

He put them in the inner cell and fastened their feet in the stocks. [But] About midnight Paul and Silas [backs bleeding from a severe beating with rods] were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. [Because nothing gets attention and admiration like singing in the pain Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that ... <u>all the prison doors flew open,</u> [which is funny, because Paul had just asked the Colossians to pray "that God may open a door for our message ... for which I am in chains." (Col 4:3) and everybody's chains came loose. ... And when [the jailer] saw the prison doors open, [he was so filled with FEAR] he drew his sword and was about to kill himself because he thought the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted, "Don't harm yourself! We are all here!" [Cuz Paul had convinced the convicts that God had opened those doors to set the jailer free! You see, we often pray for escape from the places God puts us to save those around us] The jailer called for lights, rushed in and [saw the light! And] fell TREMBLING ... and asked, "Sirs, what must I do to be SAVED?" [Because "If the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." (Jn 8:36)] ... Then they spoke the Word of the Lord to him and ... [he] washed their wounds; then immediately he and all his family were baptized. [And washed away their sins. Then] The jailer brought them into his house and set a meal before them; [and after being filled with fear] he was filled with joy ... [and] After Paul and Silas came out of the prison, they went to Lydia's house - Acts 16:24-40 NIV



Which *brings* us to our *fourth joyful story*. Because when Paul *first* went to *Philippi*, he and *Luke* went to *pray* by *this river*. Where, Luke writes:



[We] began to *speak* to the *women* who had gathered there. [And] *One* of those *listening* was a *[wealthy business] woman* named *Lydia*, a *dealer* in *purple cloth* ... [And] <u>The Lord opened her heart</u> to respond to Paul's message. [And] When *she* and the members of her *household* were *baptized*, she *invited* us to her *home*. – Acts 16:12-15 NIV

Which became the *first* and *foremost* Christian *church* in Philippi – and the *destination* of Paul's *letter* to the *Philippians*. This *piece* of *purple cloth* is *1,000* years *older* than *Lydia!* And the part of *Lydia's story* that I just *love*, is that **Paul sends his letter about** *dying* **to self to a gal who dyed for a living!** And not just any ol' dye, but royal purple – the same as the robe they draped on Jesus on His way to the *cross*, to *die* for our *sins*, on His way to His heavenly throne! And Paul writes:

I thank my God every time I remember you. [Paul writes] In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the Gospel from the first day [by the river, when God opened Lydia's heart, and she opened her home] until now, [chained to a guard, and putting Epaphroditus on a bus] being confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion [if you'll let Him] – Philippians 1:3-6 NIV

[So] Whatever happens, [like *Paul's chains* or *Epaphroditus' poor health*] conduct *yourselves* in a manner *worthy* of the *Gospel* of *Christ*. ... For it has been *granted* to *you* on *behalf* of *Christ* not *only* to believe *on* Him, but *also* to *suffer for* Him – Philippians 1:27-29 NIV

Because *suffering* doesn't *discredit* our *faith*, it *grants* us a *chance* to *strengthen* it. Like a *muscle*. But our *strength* requires the *joy* of seeing *beyond* it, like Jesus *enduring* the *cross* for the *joy* of *our salvation*. And so, *perhaps* with the *trembling* Philippian *jailer* in *mind*, Paul *urges* us to:

Continue to work out your salvation [like a muscle] with fear and trembling, [a reference to Psalm 2:11, to "Serve the Lord with fear, and rejoice with trembling"] for it is God who works in you to [retrain your] will and to [prompt you to] act — Philippians 2:12-16 NIV

[Or] ... to help you want to do and be able to do what pleases Him. – Philippians 2:12-16 NCV

Last Sunday, I loved how Noah said we don't need more willpower, we need want-power. Cuz if you don't really want something, what can willpower do? Cuz willpower is an action we take against our own will. Which is why self-control is a fruit of the Spirit (Gal 5:23) rather than a work of the selfish self. So, you gotta really want to die to self. And for that you need a stronger force than want-power. You need why-power! So, why do you want to die to self and live for Christ?

You gotta work that out for yourself with the Lord. But the wise rejoice in their whys. Because why-power fuels want-power. And with enough want-power you won't need willpower to act in a way that pleases God and gives you the strength to run your race with joy.

For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain. – Philippians 1:21 NIV

And I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. - Galatians 2:20 NIV

[So] I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my soul shall be joyful in my God; for He has clothed me with ... salvation, [and] covered me with the robe of righteousness – Isaiah 61:10 NKJ

[Because] They have washed their robes ... in the blood of the Lamb. – Revelation 7:14 NIV



So now let's practice our progress of joy in our faith with a sing-along with Paul, that comes from one of my all-time favorite Route 66 videos. I wrote the lyrics to the tune of Lydia the Tattooed Lady (by Groucho Marx) if that helps. And we're gonna have a ball — a bouncing ball. So, try to sing along with joy!

It's okay to be anxious, just don't stay anxious. You should want to:

Cast all your anxiety on Him [Why?] because He cares for you. – 1 Peter 5:7 NIV

In your *relationships* ... have the *same mindset* as Christ Jesus: who, being in *very nature God* ... made himself *nothing* by *taking* the *very nature* of a *servant* – Philippians 2:5-7 NIV

I have *learned* the *secret* of being *content* in *any* and *every* [*irritating*] *situation* [and it's simply this] I can do *everything* through *Him* who *gives* me *strength*. – Philippians 4:12-13 NIV

For the joy of the Lord is your strength. – Nehemiah 8:10 NIV

[So] Rejoice in the Lord always; and again I say, "Rejoice!" – Philippians 4:4 KJ21

And die to live. And live to give. And try to forgive the sandpaper people.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
